FIRES RAZE TWO HOOD RIVER APPLE PLANTS, TWO VANCOUVER BUILDINGS

Total Loss In Disasters Put At \$320,000

Soldiers and CCC Aid in Halting Vancouver Fire; Ten Homes Burned in British Columbia.

HOOD RIVER, Ore., July 29.—(AP)—Fire destroyed two major apple packing plants here early today causing loss estimated by firemen at nearly \$250,000.

The blaze started at 3 a. m. apparently in the Kelly Brothers apple packing plant and spread quickly into the Hood River Apple Growers' association cold storage and packing plant.

A strong westerly wind sent sparks showering over an area made tinder-dry by a week of record-breaking heat, and many spot fires were started.

Some of these dropped on the Apple Growers' association vinegar plant, but a fire was not started there.

Facilities of the local fire department were unequal to the task of checking the blaze, and the White Salmon department was summoned.

The Kelly brothers loss was estimated by firemen at \$100,000 for the plant and \$80,000 for a stock of federally bonded brandy in a warehouse. The apple association's loss was placed at \$125,000.

Insurance covered all of the losses.

Railway Cars Saved
Although the plants were along side Union Pacific tracks, no cars were burned.

The railroad line's No. 5 mail train arrived during the height of the fire. As it awaited clearance, because of hoses across the tracks, the engine was used to switch box cars away from the fire scene.

Drought Threatens Heavy Losses to American Crops and Pasture Lands

WASHINGTON, July 29.—(AP)—A mid-summer drought gripped millions of acres of American crop and pasture land today, threatening incalculable losses to farmers.

In contrast with the severe dry weather of 1934 and 1936, which was almost nationwide present drought conditions are confined principally to middle Atlantic and New England states, the southwestern "dust bowl" and sections of the Rocky mountains and upper Great lakes.

While losses have been heavy, particularly in the eastern drought belt, L. B. Kinger, the weather bureau's crop specialist, explained they were not comparable in seriousness to those of 1934 and 1936.

"Drought conditions are more localized and developed much later this year than in the severe drought years," he said. "Consequently damages will not be nearly so heavy."

Some Relief From Rain
Federal farm officials reported a sharp deficiency in moisture and high temperatures this month and dried up pastures, damaged corn, potatoes, commercial truck crops

and berries in the northeastern states. Scattered rains this week brought a degree of relief.

As much as the nation has bountiful supplies of cotton, corn, wheat and most other agricultural products, drought losses are expected to have small effect on prices and supplies, officials said.

The weather bureau has no explanation for the persistency of dry weather in the southeastern plains or its occurrence in the northeast, where droughts are uncommon.

"Droughts," said Mr. Kinger, "are weather incidents that just happen."

Reports today told of violent storms visiting Indiana, Kentucky, Missouri and southern Ontario. Communications were disrupted, barns were burned and streets flooded in the Canadian province.

In southern Alberta, however, the heat wave persisted.

Drought conditions were relieved in Colorado, New York, New England, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Wisconsin, but there was a need for more rain. In New York state dairymen started a campaign for higher milk prices as a drought relief measure.

Neutralty Bill Hit By Senator Nye
WASHINGTON, July 29.—(AP)—An attack on the administration's neutrality program by Senator Nye (R., N. D.) sidetracked the senate temporarily today from progressing toward passage of the \$1,610,000,000 lending bill.

The senate considered for an hour a leading bill amendment by Senator O'Mahoney (D., Wyo.) to safeguard private industry from possible government competition until Nye's neutrality discussion compelled the chamber to lay the matter aside without a vote.

Nye urged greater control by congress over foreign affairs, declaring that the efforts of the president and secretary of state to obtain repeal of the arms embargo threatened to involve this country in any European war that might break out.

The amendment by O'Mahoney would restrict the use of funds in the \$350,000,000 section of the lending bill for public works to fields not adequately supplied by private enterprise.

It also would provide no loan could be made where a non-competitive utility was in existence, unless a reasonable offer first were made to buy out this utility.

This provision drew fire from Senator Norris (D., Neb.). He asserted that efforts of municipalities to obtain loans to build light plants would be "out of the window" if this were adopted.

After a controversy over the wording, Senator Danaher (R., N. H.) announced he would offer a substitute amendment that would apply to all sections of the bill, broadly prohibiting any loans for plants or commercial enterprises, except hospitals, that would compete with existing plants.

Lending Bill Slashed
The senate headed for another night session unless the leadership could obtain an agreement to limit debate. Democratic Leader Barkley, who had been hopeful of obtaining a vote this afternoon,

Japan Strikes Back on Trade Pact Cutting

Japan today made formal announcement of a new trade agreement with Germany which observers believed was timed as a warning to France and Britain.

Coming only two days after the United States abrogated her 1911 treaty with Japan, the new German-Japanese agreement was seen as a warning that any unfriendly similar action by Britain or France might drive Japan into closer relations with the Rome-Berlin axis.

The Tokyo foreign office, giving unusual emphasis to an agreement which has reached only the initial stage, said the pact strengthened the anti-communist front in which Japan, Germany, Italy and other powers are bound to combat communism.

Britain instructed her Tokyo ambassador to make representations to Japan against the continuation of anti-British demonstrations in the Orient. Dispatches from China indicated that the anti-British campaign, which British assert is inspired and financed by Japanese, was spreading and becoming more open.

Navy Will Strut
Meanwhile Britain began gradual mobilization of her naval might to bring all branches of British military power to fighting peak against any eventually during August and September, which many Europeans believe will be months of tension.

Officers and men of the British navy, back from leaves which had been granted early so they would be on duty for the coming two months, prepared their ships for sea. On Monday some 12,000 reservists will report for duty and after inspections by King George August 9 reserve vessels will join the fleet for the biggest peacetime maneuvers in Britain's history.

By calling up conscripts and reserves of the navy, army and air force Britain expects to have 1,000,000 men under arms by the end of the month.

Swerve Into Ditch Slides Poles on Man
Arthur Johnson, 38, recent arrival, employed by local contractor, death victim.

Arthur Johnson, 38, of Bellingsham, Wash., was killed about 9 a. m. today near Sutherlin, while employed as a trailerman on a logging truck. The steering trailer on which he was riding slid into a drainage ditch and pulled off the end of the logs and Johnson was crushed under four 80-foot poles, Coroner H. C. Stearns reported.

Johnson came to Roseburg about ten days ago and was employed by Oscar Waterman, local piling contractor.

Surviving are the widow and three small children, who have been residing at the Roseburg Auto camp.

The accident occurred on the Deady road, about a mile south-west of Sutherlin. The logs were being hauled to Roseburg from Kellogg.

Measurements made by Coroner Stearns and Deputy Sheriff Clifford Thornton showed that the trailer had gone off the road 64 yards from the spot where the truck was stopped.

Orville C. McDowell, driver of the truck, was reported to have told officers that he had glanced into his rear view mirror just a short time before the accident occurred and that the equipment appeared to be in order.

It was believed that the trailer slid off the roadway and into the drainage ditch, which was only a few inches deep, and then pulled off the logs when it struck a board driveway. The impact apparently threw Johnson under the logs, where his crushed body was pinned down by all four of the timbers as the truck was brought to a quick stop.

Workers toiled for several hours with shovels and hydraulic jacks before the body could be removed.

Coroner Stearns reported that he had not yet determined whether an inquest would be held.

GOV. OLSON'S AIDE WINS EXONERATION
SAN FRANCISCO, July 29.—(AP)—George G. Kidwell, Gov. Culbert L. Olson's state director of industrial relations, was exonerated last night of charges of disloyalty to the American Federation of Labor.

He is a former secretary of the San Francisco AFL labor council.

The exoneration came after a five-weeks trial by a council committee headed by Sheriff Daniel C. Murphy.

Kidwell testified before a senate committee in Washington, D. C., at a hearing to consider possible amendments to the Wagner act. The California state official said that the State Federation of Labor had given an AFL charter to a "company union" in Westwood during a fight with the CIO for control of employees of the Red River Lumber company.
