KILL OF PREDATORS IN OREGON SHOWN

SALEM, July 31.—Predatory animals killed in Oregon the first six months of 1939 totaled 5472, of which 5501 were accounted for under the state-federal control program. J. D. Mickel, director of the state department of agriculture announced.

The other 1971 animals were taken under a WPA project, Mr. Mickel said. The department is sponsor for the WPA project.

Under the federal-state arrangement, the government matches bounties paid by the state. The legislature appropriated about \$30,000 for 1939 predatory animal control.

The report released by Mr. Mickel showed:

U. S. LAMB OUTPUT SHOWS DECREASE

WASHINGTON, July 31.—(AP)—The agriculture department estimates the nation's 1939 lamb crop at 31,867,000 head, compared with last year's record crop of 32,157,000 head. The decrease from last year was attributed to a smaller crop in western sheep states, particularly in Texas.

Production in the west was estimated at 20,780,000 head compared with 21,141,000 in 1938 production in the so-called "native" or eastern states was estimated at 11,987,000 head compared with 10,996,000 last year.

The estimated production in major sheep states, last year and this, respectively, included:

Idaho	1,431,000 and 1,580,000;
Utah	1,570,000 and 1,573,000;
Washington	573,000 and 579,000;
Oregon	1,580,000 and 1,522,000;
California	2,485,000 and 2,630,000.

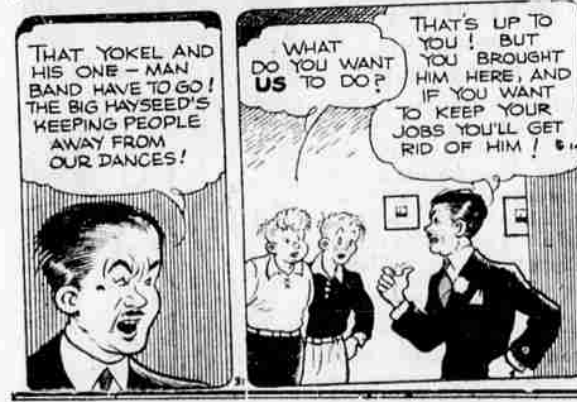
