LENDING BILL GETS HOUSE KNOCKOUT

the most helpful recovery measure that has been passed in the last six years.

Rep. Coffey (D., Neb.) told the house he hoped for defeat of the housing measure "which will draw from the federal treasury \$2,800,000,000 in the next 60 years." He apparently referred to annual rent contributions of \$45,000,000 which would be authorized in addition to \$300,000,000 to be loaned to local housing authorities for slum clearance projects.

"We can't afford to continue indefinitely to spend \$10,000,000 a day more than revenues," he said. Coffey's speech was commended by Rep. Rich (R., Penn.), one of the most persistent economy advocates in the house.

"You can not go with the spending of this administration," said Rich, "and expect this nation to survive."

The senate passed a sharply curtailed version of President Roosevelt's spending bill by a vote of 52 to 28 late yesterday. A smoothly working combination of republicans and anti-new deal democrats repeatedly overrode the administration forces to better down the lending total from \$2,800,000,000 to \$1,615,000,000.

The house leadership set mid-night tomorrow as the deadline for a final vote. There was no certainty the chamber would approve the legislation, which differs slightly from the senate bill and authorizes loans of \$1,615,000,000.

Housing Bill Outlook Dark
Repeated decisions to delay action on the housing bill, which would double the \$800,000,000 borrowing power of the United States housing authority, indicated to some congressmen it would be shelved for the session.

Although the housing bill already has been approved by the senate, some administration backers in the house said that they were urging its advocates to let it lay over until the next session. They said chances of approval would be improved by the delay.

May Adjourn This Week
With the session obviously nearing an end, the capital continued to play its adjournment guessing game. Many predicted the legislators would be on their way home before next week. Some well advised house leaders said it was "possible but not probable" congress would quit Saturday.

Senate Leader Barkley (D., Ky.) related over senate approval of the lending measure even in its drastically-reduced form, told reporters adjournment now "is up to the house."

There was some speculation on Capitol Hill Mr. Roosevelt might take a hard line in the congressional situation in an effort to insure approval of the housing measure and enactment of a lending program approximating his recommendations. His proposals envisioned loans totaling \$3,000,000,000 in addition to the housing funds.

The senate vote on the lending bill came after six days of tempestuous wrangling over restrictive amendments. Senator Barkley, author of the legislation, fought an almost singlehanded battle against the bipartisan "economy bloc," which was successful in stripping away a \$750,000,000 roads program, \$500,000,000 for railroad equipment and \$25,000,000 of the \$100,000,000 authorization to the export-import bank for financing American exports. Responding to demands of western senators, the chamber tacked on \$90,000,000 for reclamation projects.

Bonds Made Taxable
Just before the final vote, the senate accepted an amendment by Senator Byrd (D., Va.) to make bonds issued under the program taxable by both federal and state governments. It also inserted a proposal by Barkley to increase from \$750,000,000 to \$800,000,000 the amount which the RFC could lend to railroads.

Barkley explained his amendment made no change in the present borrowing power of the RFC, and did not affect the total of the bill. He asserted, however, it largely compensated for deletion of the railroad equipment provision from the lending program.

Many democrats who had joined with republicans to whittle down the lending measure voted for it on final passage. Barkley argued that the measure would stimulate business and contended it would cost the government nothing in the long run. Opponents said that much of the money loaned never would

be repaid. The final vote came as an anticlimax to the long debate, with the senators anxious to get the measure out of the way at last and the sparsely-filled galleries showing little interest.

Bills Compared
As approved by the senate, the bill contained \$600,000,000 for farm tenancy elimination, \$350,000,000 for public works, \$500,000,000 for rural electrification, \$75,000,000 for the export-import bank, and \$90,000,000 for reclamation projects.

The measure pending in the house would provide \$400,000,000 for farm tenancy, \$500,000,000 for roads, \$350,000,000 for public works, \$350,000,000 for rural electrification, \$100,000,000 for the export-import bank, and \$250,000,000 for railroad equipment.

Besides the lending and housing bills, the only important measures still before congress are amendments to the social security and wage-hour laws.

Social security bill amendments have been approved in different forms by both chambers, but may be abandoned for this session because a joint committee has been unable to reach a compromise.

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BRIDGES DEFENSE CALLS FOR DOYLE

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 1.—(AP)—The Harry Bridges defense today sought government aid to force Stanley Morley (Larry) Doyle to come to San Francisco and testify at Bridges' deportation hearing.

Doyle, San Francisco lawyer and former president of 40, 40 E., an American Legion organization, was last heard from at Lamberton, Minn. Federal authorities there reported Doyle would not respond to a defense summons because he claimed improper service of subpoenas and an insufficient guarantee of expense money.

Defense Counsel Carol King and Aubrey Grossman conferred with United States Attorney Frank J. Henjessey, who said if immigration officials would present him with a statement setting forth the facts of Doyle's refusal, he would ask a federal court order directing Doyle to return.

The Bridges hearing is in recess until Wednesday. The government charges the Australian-born west coast CIO director is deportable because he is a member of a party advocating violent overthrow of the American government.

JUDGE CUSHMAN IS SERIOUSLY ILL

TACOMA, Aug. 1.—(AP)—Suffering a heart ailment, Judge E. C. Cushman, 72, third oldest federal judge in the United States was in a poor condition at Tacoma General hospital today.

Hospital attaches reported the jurist, who celebrated his 30th year on the federal bench last July 7, was "in a poor condition and did not spend a good night."

Federal officials said his illness was brought on by overwork.

mental contract. Violence in Detroit. In Detroit, Mich., two brief skirmishes marked the CIO-UAW General Motors strike as threats of a walkout at the Packard Motor company plant developed into another dispute over bargaining representation.

Both clashes were broken up without serious injury. One man was arrested. Police said approximately 1,500 CIO pickets marched at the entrance to the Chevrolet gear and axle plant, which covers three city blocks.

In New York state, a strike of about 15,000 APL union truck drivers threatening all parts of the state except New York City and Albany areas was temporary, by accord.

Union representatives and operators agreed to continue negotiations, and a strike deadline set for last midnight was postponed to midnight Wednesday.

The trucking union is seeking an increase from a 76-cent an hour wage scale to 80 and 85 cents after one year, and 90 cents after 3 years.

In Buffalo, N. Y., the CIO transport workers union called off strike preparations affecting the International Railway company's 1,400 employees as a state supreme court order restrained a disputed closed-shop agreement between the company and an independent union.

BUTCHERS' STRIKE HITS WEST COAST MEAT PLANTS
SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 1.—(AP)—The Western Federation of Butchers, APL affiliate, announced that 1,500 employees in ten northern California plants of Swift & Co., meat and produce packers, struck yesterday in protest of the firm's alleged failure to comply with contracts and refusal to negotiate.

Milton S. Maxwell, president of the federation, said he had issued orders for a shutdown affecting 600 workers in the South San Francisco plant, as well as employees in two plants here and others in Fresno, Oakland, Vallejo, Sacramento, Modesto and San Jose.

The strike was precipitated by a vote of butchers local 508, San Francisco, Friday night. Maxwell said the western federation had approved the general plan, down last week.

Maxwell said 17 other unions would be involved, including retail butchers, machine tool engineers and auto mechanics.
