

BOY SCOUTS WILL VISIT AIR CIRCUS

May Be Assigned to Patrol Service; Hikes, Court of Honor Arranged.

Because of the interest shown by Boy Scouts in the forthcoming air circus, to be held in Roseburg August 11, the scout committee has decided to bring boys now attending camp at Wolf creek into Roseburg to see the show. They will be given credit for camp attendance during the time they are in town.

The action was taken, it was reported, because of the air-mindedness of the boys and because of an opportunity to be of assistance in patrol duty. Transportation to and from camp is being arranged by a committee directed by W. H. Gerstein.

Starting early August 9, the scouts will leave Wolf creek on a three-day hike, to be directed by E. A. Britton. The boys will be taken by truck to the Cougar creek bridge, crossing the North Umpqua river near Bogue creek. They then will travel in many stages up the Cougar creek canyon, where they will pass through a primitive area and will see a waterfall, the existence of which became known only recently. Climbing to the top of the divide between the North Umpqua and Little rivers, they will follow forest trails back to the Wolf creek camp. They will arrive early on the morning of the 11th and enjoy a brief rest before making the trip to Roseburg to attend the air circus.

Cubs to Have Outing
While the scouts are absent on their hike, boys of pre-scout age will be given a three-day camp. They will arrive at Wolf creek August 8 for the evening meal and campfire and will remain in camp under the supervision of the regular staff for three days, returning at noon August 11. Youngsters attending the Cub camp are instructed to provide themselves with three blankets, an extra pair of shoes or sneakers, an extra suit of underwear, two pairs of socks, handkerchiefs, extra shirt, flashlight and toilet articles. Cots and mattresses will be provided.

Astronomy Enjoyed
Tuesday, the scouts enjoyed a lecture and demonstration in astronomy by Jack Wharton. Much interest was shown by scouts and visitors in the high-powered telescope which Mr. Wharton set up in the barracks area. As there was a full moon and a clear sky, conditions for observation were good, the craters of the moon being clearly visible.

Features of next week will include instruction in the use of various types of compasses and reading of maps. These features will be directed by Captain Ben Irving of Roseburg on Monday.

Honor Court Held
Sunday, August 13, a court of honor will be featured at which time scouts will be awarded merit badges after having passed tests in the various subjects on which they have worked before and during camp. Scouts who have qualified for advancement in rank will receive their promotion at a court of honor. Visitors are invited to attend the ceremony, which will take place at 10 a. m. Parents and friends will find suitable places on Little river, near the camp for picnic parties or week-end camping trips.

1939 Motor Cruise: Up Larch Mountain

NEARLY EVERYONE in the least interested in hiking has climbed Larch mountain, 4045-foot-high peak back of Multnomah falls on the upper Columbia River highway. For years the peak's summit, from which five snow-capped peaks may be seen, has been a favorite spot with those who like to view the sunrise on the mountains.

Twenty years ago this writer

spent most of one night climbing the steep mountain trail from Multnomah falls to the summit and a good part of the day returning to the highway. The other day he revisited the view point without taking a single step, rolling all the way to the top in an automobile.

Since 1933 a road has been under construction from the Columbia River highway to Larch mountain summit and it is now completed. Within the next few days it will be opened to the public, with a caravan of civic leaders making the first public trip to the peak's top.

Multnomah county, the WPA and the United States forest service co-operated in building the road which has easy grades, is hard-surfaced, oiled and al-

together an inviting scenic drive, one of the finest in the vicinity. The grade, except for the last few yards, is not over 6 per cent and the last short stretch is only 8 per cent.

Distance from the Multnomah county courthouse in Portland to the summit is only 36.5 miles, an easy hour's drive. The last 10 1/2 miles is new construction, which was being oiled for public use when the visit was made to the peak recently. At the end of the road a wide parking space, large enough for 175 cars, has been built. In the center of it is a strip that will be planted with rhododendrons.

The forest service plans to build a public contact and guard station and provide a picnic ground with tables and stoves next year.

Addressing the millinery merchandising executives' association he asserted that early spring sales of last year showed the new millinery now in vogue to be unacceptable to many women.

"I cling to the conclusion," he said, "that most women will not deliberately make fools of themselves."

Dr. Paul H. Nystrom, professor of marketing at Columbia university, deplored the growing practice of retail stores in closing stores early at night, opening them late in the morning, shutting doors Saturdays and holidays and in the middle of the week.

"For those of us who are still working for a living and trying to make ends meet," he said, "it has become something of a problem to get to a retail shop at a time when it is open for business."
