Holders of medium wools in the middle west who were asking unduly high rates last week have lowered their limits to the established market but mills are not so keen as they were. Sales in the far west have been at firm rates of fine wools."

"Foreign markets have been very dull and a bit easy, especially on Merinos."

"The piecegoods markets are distinctly slower both in men's and women's wear."

"Mohair is slower but steady on every moderate trading."
