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As we go to press today it is a little hard for the people in this newspaper plant to concentrate on the job at hand. It is air circus day and the planes are dropping overhead, the sound being audible above the ordinary noises of a busy print shop.

This is the first time since the establishment of the airport here that a really large group of planes and fliers has made use of the facility.

The development and expansion of aviation that was fully anticipated at the time the airport was created by the city never took place—at least not on the scale that would make the airport here an important transportation center. Planes never have become common equipment in public use.

But airplanes are, by now, and successful performance especially in passenger and mail service, flying down the popular notion that they are dangerous and death dealing contrivances.

Possibly we were right in theory ten years ago when we thought planes would be almost as common as autos within a few years. It takes money to own and operate a plane just as it takes money to own and operate an automobile. Shortly after the Roseburg airport was completed the economic depression set in. It may be that economic conditions had as much if not more to do with the failure of the airplane business to develop, than did the mechanical problems inherent in flying.

There can be no discounting the airplane as a means of transportation. It is a well-known fact that passenger air lines are serious competitors for the regular motor bus and train passenger carriers. The airmail service is generally regarded as efficient and reliable as the mail service on land—only much swifter.

It may be that people will not take to the individual ownership and flying of planes and that aviation will develop on an organized basis as at present, but shows like the one here today are going to do a lot toward making people want to own and fly their own planes.

Germany Loses Trade as Refugees Find U. S. Haven

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 10.—A German who used to own a shirt factory in Germany and sell his product to South America has emigrated to this country, has opened a factory and is employing American labor.

Practically all our harmoniums and accordions used to come from Germany; now a refugee has set up a shop for the making of these instruments and he employs American workers.

A certain German firm used to send fine woolen hose to this country. Now the three members of that firm, all refugees, have re-established it in Massachusetts where they are employing 35 American workers in manufacture of the same type of hose.

Still another refugee brought with him from Germany a patent wood product used in the manufacture of gloves; the business he established here is doing an annual business of \$100,000.

Wants Public to Know
These are just a few of the facts on refugees revealed by the American Friends' service committee (A. F. S. C.), who are doing yeoman service in helping refugees from Germany and Italy.

Clarence E. Pickett, executive secretary of the A. F. S. C., and winner of this year's Dink award for his refugee work, is particularly anxious that the public at large be apprised of the true facts about refugees, to counteract unfavorable publicity and false rumors.

"Consider the following summary of the refugee problem," exclaims Pickett. "These human beings are a consumer. He eats, he wears clothes; he requires a place to live. Every immigrant who comes to America is as much a consumer as anyone else, and his wants have to be supplied by American business and factories."

"In this sense the refugees are actually providing work for American labor. This is especially true of the women and children among the refugees. Perhaps about a third of them will become wage earners. This number must be reduced still further, however. Many of the refugees are intellectuals—writers, scientists, scholars. They will help to make our country the cultural center of the modern world by the knowledge they bring."

"The large proportion of them are of course workmen, business men and manufacturers. Of these individuals there will be quite a few who will bring to our country new businesses and skills which we have lacked."

Not All Refugees Jews
Pickett feels that there are many facts about the present-day refugees which are not sufficiently clear to the public. For instance, most people think that the refugees from Germany are all Jews.

As a matter of fact, in 1938, 60,000 of all refugees from Germany were Christians. Pickett estimates. In the years before that the proportion was higher. According to the best estimate available there are about 100,000 Jews by religion still in Germany and about 200,000 non-Aryan Christians, that is, Christians with some percentage of Jewish blood.

"Up to the present, these refugees have been divided in the proportion of five Jews to two Christians, but this proportion does not mean that Christians are not anxious to leave Germany, Austria and Czechoslovakia. It merely means that the Jewish communities were the first to be hit and as a result have had more time to consider their situation, etc. If the Christians of the United States increase their assistance to their fellow-refugees the proportion of Christian refugees will be great."

GIANT SWEDS SEEKS PRIZEFIGHT FAME
CHICAGO, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Comes now a giant Swedish brick layer, from across the sea, to seek fame and fortune in the ring as a heavyweight boxer.

He's Arne Anderson, 21-year-old weighing 295 pounds and standing six feet four inches. He comes with the reputation of being a terrific pugilist, winning 10 of his 11 professional battles by quick knockouts, and his showing in his first two engagements shows landing in the United States two weeks ago has bolstered his European reputation. He flouted his first opponent six times to win on a technical knockout and stopped his second in two rounds.

Anderson will get his first serious test when he engages Billy Burke, Jr., son of the late heavyweight contender, in a 10-round contest at St. Paul, August 21.
