GIVEN PLANE TRIP

Journey to Coos and Return in Air Tour's Flagship Proves Big Treat.

Through the courtesy of the United Air Lines and the local committee sponsoring the appearance at Roseburg of the 1939 air tour, a Roseburg group enjoyed a very delightful flight yesterday to Coos Bay and return.

The trip was made in the United Air Lines airliner, flagship of the air tour.

The ship was in charge of Captain C. C. Conklin, Jr., superintendent of flying for the west coast division. Captain Conklin has charge of all pilots west of Chicago. T. W. Davis served as first officer, and other members of the crew were Miss Ruth Kellisher, stewardess, and A. M. Nelson, traffic manager. Miss Kellisher is the senior stewardess for United Air Lines on the Portland-Salt Lake division. Mr. Nelson is travelling traffic representative for the division.

Wide Sweep Made

The plane was flown from Roseburg to Coos Bay, flying for the last few miles over a beautiful cloud bank, then dropping down to skim the coast line, and circle an outboard lumber schooner steaming out of the bay.

Despite the fact that the air was unusually "bumpy," the passengers on the flight were enthusiastic over the riding comfort of the luxurious air liner and the great courtesy shown by the members of the crew.

The \$75,000 air liner was one of the centers of attraction at the air show, and was inspected by hundreds of persons yesterday.

"The United Air Lines is greatly interested in the development of aviation, and a widespreadness throughout the nation," Mr. Nelson said. "The company thought enough of the Oregon Air Tour that it is furnishing this costly plane as flagship for the tour, and in donating the services of Captain Conklin, the senior flying officer in the western division, and other members of the crew. We have found Oregon people to be extremely interested in aviation and are looking forward to a wider use of the airways in the future."

HOOVER HITS BACK AT BARKLEY'S CLAIM

PALO ALTO, Calif., Aug. 12.—(AP)—Former President Herbert Hoover asserted today Senator Barkley of Kentucky "had been seriously misinformed by the L.A.S. Research Bureau when he told the national convention of young democrats in Philadelphia yesterday the Hoover administration had jumped the national debt \$5,000,000,000."
