DANZIG DISPUTE MAY BE SETTLED

Two rivers, about 300 miles east of Lake Ior.

This attack and another the following day by a force of 1,000 Manchukuo soldiers was reported repulsed, the attackers leaving 250 dead after hand-to-hand fighting.

Japanese anti-aircraft guns downed five of 30 planes which raided Japanese lines Thursday in the vicinity of the border town of Haimanhan, 60 miles east of the river junction, the communiqué said.

Thirteen of 70 soviet-Mongol air raiders were reported shot down in a Saturday raid in the same area, theater of fighting since a dispute over the location of the border flared May 11.

The Japanese contend the Khatka river is the true Manchukuo-Outer Mongolia boundary; the Russians say it is several miles to the east of the stream.

Jews Barred From Shanghai SHANGHAI, Aug. 14.—(AP)—The municipal council, governing body of the international settlement, announced today "no further European refugees will be permitted to land at Shanghai."

The order, designed to prevent further influx of Jewish immigrants, followed a similar ban, effective Aug. 21, which the Japanese announced last Friday for the section of the settlement they control north of Soochow creek.

The municipal council requested consular authorities to notify shipping companies of the order.

The council spokesman said Shanghai authorities are "not unsympathetic toward the plight of refugees, but the city is unable to absorb more because of overcrowding and the strain on municipal policing and health facilities."

"Shanghai has done its share on the problem, and now it is up to others."

It was estimated 500 Jews are en route to Shanghai. There, it was said, would be permitted to land.

BRATISLAVA, Slovakia, Aug. 14.—(AP)—Police guarded Bratislava's ghetto today after an outbreak of anti-semitic violence, and the German minority newspaper Grenzbeobachter charged Slovak Jews with "unbearable provocation."

"The cause of the demonstration was the impudent attack on a few Germans by cheeky Jews," the paper said.

Two synagogues were stormed by a mob early Saturday morning and Jews were beaten on the streets. Another mob smashed into a Jewish club last night.

PRAGUE, Aug. 14.—(AP)—State police sought the occupants of a roadster today who abandoned the wreckage after a collision injured six Hilgard residents Saturday night.

The crash occurred when the roadster swung out and a girl striking another car and a girl bicyclist.
