## 8 MILLION MEN READY TO FIGHT

LONDON, Aug. 16.—(AP)—Europe's men under arms, exclusive of naval and air forces, were estimated today at 8,500,000 by a military writer for Reuters, British news agency.

The writer concluded there appeared to be a "fairly even balance" at the moment between the land forces of the Rome-Berlin axis and the British-French front and associated powers.

The breakdown of the estimate: France, 1,900,000; Britain, 600,000; Poland, 600,000; Turkey, 300,000; Rumania, 275,000; and Greece, 200,000; total, 2,875,000.

The Rome-Berlin axis: Italy, 650,000; Germany, 1,750,000; total, 2,400,000 or 2,900,000 if 500,000 is added for Hungary.

Regrouped were figures of 150,000 for Spain and 300,000 for Yugoslavia.

In still another bystander or neutral category were 400,000 for Bulgaria, Belgium, the Baltic states, The Netherlands, Portugal and Switzerland.

The review concluded: "The biggest counterweight is naturally soviet Russia, whose 2,000,000 men would give a marked predominance to any group with which they made common cause."

## WASCO APPROVES UTILITY DISTRICT

THE DALLES, Aug. 16.—(AP)—The second major public utility district approved in Oregon was endorsed by Wasco county voters yesterday, 12,673-998, on the basis of incomplete reports.

The Dalles and most rural precincts favored the district but Astoria and Mosier did not.

Recently Hood River valley rural precincts approved a PUD, although Hood River urban voters rejected it.

## OIL SUPPLY CUT TO HOLD PRICE

OKLAHOMA CITY, Aug. 16.—(AP)—More than half the country's crude oil supply was cut off today as three states took the lead in a fight against a threatened collapse of the industry's price structure.

## 1939 PRUNE CROP TWICE LAST YEAR'S

PORTLAND, Aug. 16.—(AP)—Although the Oregon prune crop will be almost twice as large as 1938, the August estimate was slightly under July, the federal bureau of agriculture economists said today.

Western Oregon's fresh prune production was estimated at 158,200 tons against 145,500 in July and 78,700 in 1938. The Washington estimate of 21,400 tons was 700 less than a month ago but 19,600 more than last year.

Recent sales of 1939 dried prunes in 25-pound boxes, f. o. b. Portland docks were 5 cents for 30-35s, 3 1/2 cents for 35-40s and 2 1/2 cents for 40-45s. Sacked prunes were a fourth cent less.

English buyers took 251,750 pounds of the 405,530 pounds shipped from here last month. Small amounts went to Norway, Argentina, Belgium, France and Holland.

For the first seven months of the year Portland exported 4,562,582 pounds, principally to the United Kingdom and Belgium.
