PRUNE COMMITTEE NAMED AT MEET

SALISBURY, Aug. 16. (AP)—Oregon prune growers applauded speakers who advised them yesterday to "let the prunes rot on the trees rather than accept prices below cost of production" but growers, packers and canners created a committee to assist the industry, solve the problems of a bumper crop and low prices.

Gov. Sprague will select the committee with the aid of J. D. Mickle, state director of agriculture.

A state bureau to standardize the fruit as to quality and merchandise and advertise it was formed.

Gov. Sprague said the industry would get more satisfactory prices if it united.

SEND REFUGEES TO ALASKA SAYS ICKES

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16. (AP)—Refugees from Europe should be permitted to settle in Alaska, Secretary Ickes believes, as a means of developing the territory and strengthening its defenses.

European industries "broken up or diverted by current waves of intolerance" should be transplanted to Alaska, Ickes said yesterday in a statement approving a report prepared under the direction of Harry Statter, undersecretary of the interior.

ATHLETE ILL WITH DREADED DISEASE

PENDLETON, Oreg., Aug. 16. (AP)—La Vern Van Marter, a member of last fall's University of Oregon freshman football squad, and also a skilled tennis player, is in isolation in St. Anthony's hospital here, a victim of infantile paralysis.

Young Van Marter, whose home is at Hoppper but who had been employed here by the Pendleton Grain Growers, was taken ill Monday night. Today both legs were paralyzed.

ATTORNEY DODGES CALL AS WITNESS

NEW ULM, Minn., Aug. 16. (AP)—Larry Doyle, Lamberton, Minn., attorney who is sought as a star witness in the deportation trial of Harry Bridges, in San Francisco, told newspapermen here today he is dodging subpoenas to testify at the trial until the prosecution calls him as a witness.

Doyle said the defense is anxious to put him on the stand, get all of his evidence, and bring in a troupe of witnesses to deny every statement he makes.

4-H CLUBS SEND PHEASANTS OUT

More Than Thousand Liberated in Douglas, Coos and Lane Counties.

A total of 1,192 china pheasants, raised by 4-H club members in Douglas county, were liberated Monday and Tuesday in various parts of Douglas, Coos and Lane counties, E. A. Britton, county club leader, reported today.

Since Coos and Lane counties are to be closed to pheasant hunting this year, about one-half of the birds raised by Douglas county club members were liberated in those counties.

During the past four years the Oregon state game commission has permitted club members to raise pheasants for liberation. The club members are furnished eggs and instructions free by the commission and are required to provide pens, pens, care and feed until the birds are at least ten weeks old. According to reports on the work, the average cost per bird has been 30 cents, which left a profit of 15 cents to the grower, as the commission pays 75 cents for each bird liberated. This year the club members of Douglas county received 4,909 eggs and will be liberating approximately 2,900 mature birds.

John McKean, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. A. McKean of Roseburg, was in charge of the liberation for the game commission. He, with two assistants, picked up all the birds ready for liberation.

Mr. Britton reports some club members experienced a little difficulty in raising the birds, due to failure to closely follow instructions of the commission, and in a few cases because attempts were made to raise too many birds with the equipment available. Otherwise, he states, the project has been very successful and highly satisfactory.

The council's decision ordered the stage hands' to keep out of the actors' union field and urged the Associated Actors and Artists of America to take back the American Federation of Actors, stated recently from the AFAA on charges of insubordination by its leaders.
