

## NEWCOMERS AID LEAGUE LEADERS

### Cincinnati and Yankees Win on Hurling by Yank Farm Hands.

The question of "how you gonna keep 'em down on the farm?" is a problem still confronting the major league today.

All because yesterday two ex-Yankee farm hands performed their chores so well both the Cincinnati Reds and the Yankees are enjoying seven-game marathons.

The "farmhand" heroes of the new season program are Johnny Niggeling and Charlie Keller, products of the vast Yankee system.

Niggeling, who has been with Kansas City and Newark of the Yankee domain, paced the Reds to a 1-0 victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates in his first start in a Yankee uniform. The veteran, more recently at Indianapolis, scattered eight hits to keep the Reds from scoring.

Keller came through for the part of the game with a convincing double that scored Red Ruff with the winning run for a 2-1 decision over the Washington Senators.

One-run marathons were generally the rule in the National League.

In addition to the Reds' win, the St. Louis Cardinals slipped by the Chicago Cubs, 7-6, in a ten-inning tie.

Don Bowman was the most successful of the lot, getting credit for the win by striking home Tim Lincecum with the winning run.

Bees Still Jinxed

The Boston Bees were again dropping their 23rd encounter of the season by that margin to the Philadelphia Phillies.

They just finished a road trip in which they lost 10 games by that margin and the 43 pummeling from the Phillies hardly augurs well for an end to the streak.

Walter Dick hosted Lou Pette, though Lou Pette up only six hits.

The one N. L. game not decided by a one-run margin went to the Dodgers, 3-2, over the New York Giants.

Luke Hamlin was a little short of sensational, being touched and home for the first time in 12 blows.

But the Dodgers won it the easy way, piling up all their runs in the first three innings and then coasting home.

The Detroit Tigers' combination of Buck Newson's hurling and Benny McCoy's hitting was too much for the Cleveland Indians.

By 1-0, Buck hurled three-hit ball to get his 14th win of the season and Benny drove home six runs.

Lynn Nelson of the Athletics caused the Boston Red Sox to slip when he walked the whitesash bunch to win a night game, 3-0.

St. Louis and Chicago were idle.

### DUCK REGULATIONS ANNOUNCED BY ICKES

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—(AP)—Secretary Ickes announced today there would be a 45-day season for duck hunting this fall under regulations covering the 1939 migratory bird season.

The new rules, approved by President Roosevelt in accordance with the Federal migratory bird treaty with Canada and Mexico, listed 20 outstanding changes for waterfowl hunting.

The season in the intermediate zone, between the mid section of the country from California to New Jersey, Ickes said, will open October 22 instead of October 15, and the daily bag limit on geese will be reduced from five to four.

## 1939 Motor Cruise: To Long Beach

This newspaper is co-operating with the Oregon State Motor association and The Oregonian in presenting a series of motorlogs designed to stimulate travel in Oregon and the Pacific northwest. This article was condensed from a full-page article appearing in The Oregonian July 16.

The Long Beach, Washington, peninsula, famed for its 28-mile-long ocean beach, swimming, and its fine surf bathing, attracted the white motorlog automobile of The Oregonian-Oregon State Motor association in a loop trip that provided 285 miles of scenic interest over good roads.

The trip to the beaches was made from Portland via Vancouver, then down the north bank of the Columbia river through Longview, Cathlamet, Skamokawa, to Ilwaco at the mouth of the river, a total distance of 138 miles.

Skamokawa, Grays River, Naselle the motorloggers discovered were picturesque towns that still retain the charm of this pioneer country, a virtual stranger to highways and automobiles until within recent years.

The highway down the north bank of the river was found to be excellent except where the narrow, winding road over the "K-M" hill west of Skamokawa and a few newly graded sections required slow speed.

From Ilwaco the Long Beach peninsula stretches 28 miles north, flanked by the Pacific on one side, Willapa bay on the other. The bustling resort cen-

ters of Seaview, Long Beach, Ocean Park and others attract thousands of vacationists and holiday merrymakers. A good gravel surface road extends up the peninsula as far as Oysterville, quaint and popular vacation spot. Or the motorist may drive the hard sands of the ocean beach.

The return portion of the loop trip was made by crossing the Columbia river on one of the big ferry boats that ply between Astoria and Megler, Wash., the latter point 11 miles east of Ilwaco. Average time of crossing the great river is 25 minutes.

The return route from Astoria was eastward up the Columbia over the paved Lower Columbia River highway, a distance of 105 miles.

## COLORED GHOSTS THRILL BIG CROWD

### Negro Softball Team Gives Exhibition of Skill and Clowning.

Those alchemists, Merle, Blackstone and Hoodini, were a bunch of pickers as compared to those ebony-bred ghosts, famous traveling negro softball team, when it comes to conjuring up a bewitching potion of mysto-magic, sleight-of-hand, skull-duggery, "now-you-see-me, now-you-don't" activity as pertains to softball which kept an overflow crowd that filled every nook and cranny of Pinkey field last night in a state of near-hysteria.

Titled as a "clowning" softball team of all-star ability, these dusky exponents of the game as it should be played, lived up to every extravagant promise, putting on a grand show of real baseball and entertainment from the moment they appeared on the diamond to warm up with the superlatives, the "ghost" ball game, which will long be remembered.

These negro artists did everything in the book "screwy," still the outcome of the game was never in doubt. Their comic antics, both at the plate and on the field, had the players, umpires and packed stands convulsed throughout the nine innings of play. Unhindered by a string of rapid-fire chatter, filled with plenty of comedy that never touched a dull moment, they welcomed and enjoyed continuous laughter between the players and the paying customers.

Umpires Baited.

Since keepers, umpires, and, by the way, the Eke team, which I forgot to mention as being the opposition during the evening, were kept in a complete dither by the "ghosts" unorthodox style of play. They loafed on hits, yet always made the base in time; they stole first; players on first and second exchanged places; another, stole first and second exchanged places; another stole first from third. They loomed the umpire when he called their own players, safe on close decisions; they argued with the arbiters on called balls, insisting they should have been strikes.

They sat down on the bases, laid down in the field, and played most of the game with their right fielder on the sidelines arguing with the crowd. They made that old soft-ball do tricks never before seen on this field—popping out of unexpected places, appearing when and where everyone least expected to see it.

And when they wanted to, they played ball. Every player on the team appeared to be an expert and star in his own right. They whipped the ball around the diamond with dazzling speed and accuracy and made the most difficult plays look like kindergarten stuff. Even when they exchanged positions, as they so often did, little difference in ability was noted. They simply "noosed" confidence and talent.

Ghost Ball Pleases.

The climax to a most hilarious evening was their famous "ghost" game. Playing without a ball, the entire squad went through every motion of a team in action from the first warm-up to the final out of the game. In pantomime and slow motion, they performed the most difficult maneuvers—smashing out hits, striking out, catching fly balls, arguing with the umpires over close decisions, stealing bases, sliding, making beautiful stops and

throws, and even now and then an error—all to the huge enjoyment of the bleachers.

The Eke tried hard, for a time, but soon realizing that they were no match for the wizardry of these softball artists, entered into the spirit of the fun which added much to the entertainment.

Incidentally, the final score was 4 to 1 in favor of the Ghosts, but no one cared. Judging from the brief glimpses of their inherent ability, it could have been 40 to 1 had they so desired, or at least it appeared so. In case there might be one or two interested in the outcome of the preliminary contest, the league-leading Dunham Transfer, Inc. power-housed a 11-0-2 victory

over Safeway. The crowd, impatient for the feature attraction of the evening to get underway, overlooked a fine pitching performance by Pin Larrance, who, aided by some fine defensive work by his teammates, came with an "ace" of turning in a no-hit performance, but he weakened in the final inning to allow the only two hits of the game.

## DALLESANDRO IS SOLD TO CHICAGO

### Leading Hitter of Coast League to Join Cubs Next Spring.

Sale of Dominic Dallesandro, hard-hitting outfielder for the San Diego Padres, to the Chicago Cubs for \$17,500 and two players was the talk of the day in the Pacific coast baseball league today.

Dallesandro, the league's leading hitter with a percentage of around .375, will go to the Cubs in the spring. The deal was negotiated by John P. Connelly, newly-elected president of the Padres.

The San Diego club will get Steve Mesner, former Los Angeles shortstop, now with Milwaukee in the American association, and a pitcher, an option, plus the \$17,500 cash.

Dallesandro went to San Diego from the Boston Red Sox two years ago.

The Padres, meanwhile, dropped a 5 to 4 game to the league-leading Seattle Rainiers at Seattle last night, enabling Seattle to move up a full game on the second-place Los Angeles Angels who accumulated 8 to 4, to a four-run blast in the ninth by the San Francisco Seals, at Los Angeles.

Jimmy (Rip) Collins drove in all of the Los Angeles runs, one of his important blows being his 24th home of the year in the eighth with two bases aboard. The four Seals runs were off Al Epperly.

At Portland, the up-and-coming Beavers moved up a step into fifth place by winning both ends of a twin bill from Sacramento, 8 to 4 and 7 to 2. Smooth twirling by Bill Thomas was a big factor in the opening game, the Beavers arching across four runs in the eighth.

The Hollywood-Oakland game at Oakland was postponed because the Oak Park had been torn up by United States cavalry horses participating in an American Legion drill contest.
