

CAREY WINS OVER DALLAS BENNETT

Blonde Canadian Claims Oregon Title—Fight Card Dull.

The educated left hand of Rex Carey, blonde Canadian scout, knocked the crown off the head of Dallas Bennett, La Grande, Oregon, former champion to the Oregon light heavyweight title last night as Bennett came but helpless, sprawled on the canvas at the close of the fifth round of their scheduled 10-round main event at the arena.

Aside from the main event and a fair semifinal, between substitute fighters, the card was very disappointing to the large crowd of fans. Two bouts which had been expected to be whirlwind encounters, ended in one-round knockouts. Harvey Vallier, polishing off Paul Brinkman in 26 seconds, and the Kenton of Sutherland putting shrew Brewster of Powers out of the picture in 25 seconds.

The semi-final featured Young Nationalista II of New York against Bobby Gibbons of Portland, Gibbons taking the count in the fifth round.

In a four-round preliminary, Jules Solomon of Roseburg collapsed in the last round to chalk up a victory for his opponent, Louis Franco.

The main event saved an otherwise dull program as the two brawlers, with the title at stake, gave the crowd a good show of skill and gameness.

Bennett Down Six Times
Carey, 161 pounds, had a considerable advantage in reach over Bennett, weighing 148 pounds. The two boys boxed easily in the first two rounds, Bennett working to the body, while Carey countered with hard left hooks and jabs to the head. Bennett got into trouble early in the third round when he was floored by one of Carey's hard lefts. He took the count of nine, then came back fighting hard and near the close of the round rocked the Canadian boy with a volley of hard rights and lefts to the jaw.

Carey continued the use of a long left and near the close of the fourth round again put Bennett on the floor.

The fifth round was barely underway when Bennett was hit by a hard left and went down for the count of nine. He came up dazed and rubber-legged but, amazingly, wanted in struggling with both hands. Twice again he picked himself off the floor but just before the close of the round a hard punch sent him sprawling and Referee Sussie increased the count.

It was Carey's second win over Bennett, who lost to the rugged Canadian boy in a fight at La Grande last February.

A substitution was made in the semifinal in which a rough Filipino boy Young Nationalista II, 124, of New York, was pitted against Bobby Gibbons, 130, of Portland. The fight was arranged at the last minute, following receipt of word from Al McKewen, of Marshfield that he had suffered injuries in an accident and could not appear.

The Filipino, driving hard punches to the body, put Gibbons down three times in the fifth round, and had doubled up the Portland boy with a hard blow under the heart as Referee Foster, who officiated in all except the main event, stopped in to halt the battle.

Fenton Beats Brewster
The scheduled six-round special event between Babe Fenton, 125, Sutherlin, and Blue Brewster, 125, Powers, lasted only 25 seconds. This fight was expected to be a highlight of the card. In a previous meeting at an arena in the city of Astoria, Fenton, who had been able to stay the distance with Fenton last night, however, Fenton demonstrated that he is able to learn, and when the two started the long range fight, which had Fenton looking at his previous opponent, the Sutherlin slugger ducked under a long left and lifted Brewster off the floor with his sensational short right to the jaw.

The fight between Paul Hindman, 124, Roseburg, and Harvey Vallier, 125, Roseburg, which also was a rematch after they had performed well in a previous encounter, was even shorter lived. Vallier met Hindman as the latter came out of his corner. This time Vallier was victorious without thought of protection, and at the end of 20 seconds of furious miffing, Hindman was on the canvas for the count.

Jules Solomon, 158, of Roseburg, lost to Louis Franco, 160, of Roseburg, in the closing seconds of a four-round preliminary. Solomon, who at least was even with Franco up to that time, suddenly collapsed, only seconds before the final bell and had to be carried to his corner.

The seconds reported that he had worked eight hours driving truck Wednesday, and rushed to the arena without rest to go into the ring.

Four Time Wniner Over New York Fails in Fifth Attempt.

Leonard gave only six hits and pitched five hitless, runless innings in a row. However, his other legs included a pair of doubles in the first inning, one of them by Joe Judge, a home run by Al Maz, with one on in the seventh and another homer by Red Rolfe in the eighth. His own teammates were swept into wrinkles by Marvyn Ross, rookie southpaw, who pitched a four-hitter.
