BONNEVILLE READY TO FURNISH POWER

PORTLAND, Aug. 17.—(AP)—The Bonneville project will be ready to distribute power as soon as Wasco and Hood River people's utility districts establish facilities, Frank A. Banks, acting administrator, said today.

Northern Wasco county approved the district at a special election Monday while rural Hood River county voted for a similar proposal several weeks ago.

Bids will be opened for a 110,000-volt transmission line through both districts to The Dalles within 30 days and construction will be completed by June 30, 1940. The administration will assist Wasco county in solving engineering and accounting problems.

A number of power districts proponents have suggested a union of Wasco, Hood River and Klickitat, Wash., counties to acquire Pacific Power & Light company facilities.
