

BIDS CALLED ON BONNEVILLE UNIT

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 17.—(AP)—Acting Bonneville Administrator Frank A. Banks will open bids September 12 for a 220,000-volt transmission line across Clark and Cowlitz counties in Washington to connect with the Vancouver-Kelso substations.

He said today the action was preliminary to extending the network into the Puget Sound region. Approximately 191 steel towers, 50 to 70 feet high, will carry 123 miles of cable over the 41-mile right-of-way. Several hundred men will be employed to complete the project late next spring.

The line will extend northwesterly from Vancouver, passing within a mile and a half of La Center and eight miles of Kalama. The route will be through the Salmon creek, Pleasant valley, Good Hope, Pioneer, Highland and Martin's Bluff districts.

Banks said the circuit would provide energy to well-settled farming country in southwestern Washington similar to the Vancouver-Kelso power lines service in western Oregon.

Kelso will act as the division point for power sent north to Chehalis and Puget Sound and, ultimately, west to Aberdeen, Cathlamet and nearby communities. Bonneville engineers are studying plans for a Kelso station to handle the heavy load.

The administration already owns about 50 per cent of the right-of-way. More than 500 WPA workers have drawn \$18,000 in wages for clearing brush and timber.

DECLINE SHOWN IN GENERAL RELIEF

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—(AP)—A decline last month in the amount of general relief from public funds in 104 cities was reported today by the social security board.

Reports from the cities showed a decrease of one per cent in the number of cases receiving such relief and a decrease of five per cent in obligations incurred, the board said.

Decreases in the number of cases ranged from less than one per cent to 5 per cent. Increases ranged from less than one per cent to 49 per cent.

Sixty-three cities had decreases in obligations incurred. Decreases were from less than one per cent to 41 and increases from less than one to 30.

The board explained general relief from public funds includes all state and local relief in cash and in kind extended to the needy.
