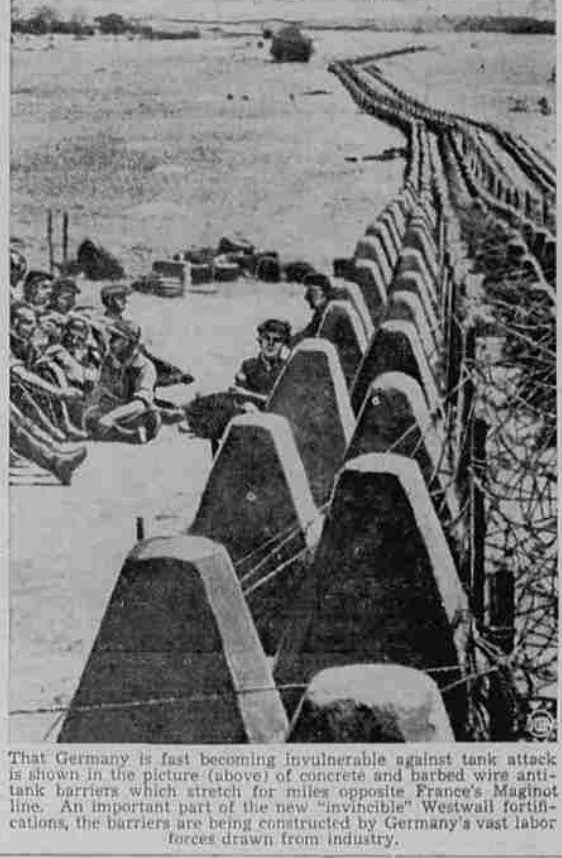
**TREES**

## WHEAT BENEFITS ARE ANNOUNCED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18.—(AP)—The agricultural adjustment administration announced today wheat farmers would receive benefit payments of 18 to 22 cents a bushel for complying with the 1940 crop control program.

This is from six to 10 cents a bushel less than payments of 28 cents on the 1939 crop, officials explained the national wheat acreage allotment of \$2,000,000 acres for next year was larger than this year's allotment of \$5,000,000 acres, thus causing the reduced payments.

The benefit payments are based on normal yield on acreage allotments to the individual farmers.

The AAA said the 18 to 22 cent range included both conservation and price adjustment payments from the \$725,000,000 provided by congress for payments on wheat, corn, cotton, tobacco and rice.

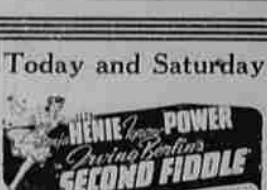
