Second and Third Place Position Cause of Argument as Week Ends.

With the City Softball league entering the final week of play, Monday, the high-stepping Dunham's Transfersmen find themselves automatically in the playoffs with the Elks Club, winners of the first half. The league-leaders are out in front of the second place team, Boucoek's by two full games, and though they must play the Boucoek's aggregation next week, a reversal will not affect their leadership as the National Guard has forfeited all their remaining games, including one to Dunham's also scheduled for the final week.

Some controversy is rife over the respective positions of the second and third place teams in the race at the end of this week's play, arising over the game played last night between the Elks Club and Sutherland. From the information gathered, it appears that the Elks team failed to have their full squad at Finlay field last night, necessitating the earning of two extra players from the Bleachers to fill out, and Sutherland, after waiting over an hour for the Elks to arrive, was forced to play a short game of five innings which the Elks won, 16 to 4. According to all rules and regulations, a team failing to have their full roster on the field after 15 minutes delay, automatically forfeits the game.

If the forfeiture is disallowed, then the Elks Club and Boucoek's are tied for second place instead of as shown above in the standings. Either way, the controversial game will have no effect on the Transfersmen's walkaway with the second half title.

In a tight game at Finlay field last night, Dunham's dropped a 9-to-5 decision to a visiting aggregation from North Bend. Both teams clicked for a run in their respective halves of the first inning, but the North Bendsters slipped out in front in the third by tallying twice on one hit, two errors, a walk and a fielder's choice. Dunham's tied it up again in the fourth by scoring twice on a walk to Phil Lawrence and Vanny Baker's home run. A big fifth inning rally put the game on ice for North Bend when they chalked up four runs on five hits. Dunham's came back in the same frame to pound out a like number of blows but they were good for only two runs.

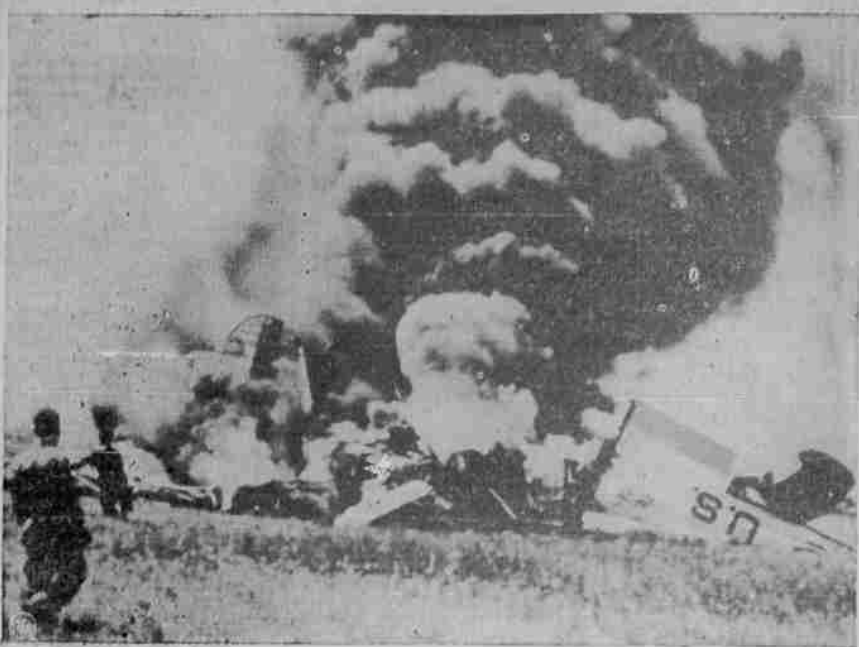

Nine Die in Army Bomber Crash



A blazing mass of twisted steel and fabric, this U. S. army bomber carried a crew of nine to death on a practice flight at Langley Field, Va., Aug. 11. Piloted by 1st Lt. Homer M. MacKay, commissioned last week, the huge twin-engine Douglas crashed in flames shortly after take-off. Crash crews raced to the scene on hearing the explosion as the plane struck ground, but could not remove bodies for two hours because of heat from the flames. A three-man board is investigating the crash, believed caused by motor trouble. This picture was taken immediately after the crash.

Leaving Portland on Sunday, our tour took us southward to Eugene, from where we embarked on the new Willamette Pass highway now nearing completion and expected to be ready for through travel next year.

A 925-foot tunnel was being rushed to a finish on the pass highway said to cut 50 miles

from the northern Oregon-California travel and which many believe would soon carry a major share of Pacific coast-wise motor travel.

Grading has been completed on each end of the project and only about four miles at the tunnel remains to be contracted. Federal public roads administration officials said it was to be contracted this year, pointing to use of the highway next year.

After visits at Odell, Crescent and Diamond lakes—beauty spots of the Cascades and where we found Californians preponderantly in the majority—we were told at Crater lake that the tourist business was definitely on the up-beat.

Registrations at the lodge, we were told, were eight times better than at the same time any previous year, and park administration officials told us that 1939 motor traffic was then up 23.9 per cent over the park's banner season of two years ago.

Californians outnumbered Oregonians here on week days,

but not on Sundays, we were told.

MAJOR LEAGUES SEE PITCHING DUELS

Wildness Costs Feller Game With White Sox in 11 Innings.

There is a feller pitching for the Cleveland Indians who has been standing on the threshold of baseball's hall of fame so long he might be mistaken for a monument.

But his chances of entering apparently depend on how soon he learns pitching, like driving an automobile, calls for control along with speed, the Van Meter (Lay) speed demon tangled in the big show's hottest hurling duel of the season last night and lost, 1-0, in 11 innings to Lefty Ed Smith and the Chicago White Sox.

Young Bob gave only one hit in nine innings, a single to Jack Hayes in the third, but kept himself in the fire with five bases on balls, an error and two wild pitches.

Then in the eleventh, he walked Smith and was touched for a double by Hayes and a single by Mike Krschick to lose the game.

This flashy performance was in contrast to methodical efforts of Smith, who spread seven hits and walked only two batters. It explains, with no need for elaboration, why Feller has won only 17 games this campaign and lost seven.

The abbreviated program in the majors yesterday was packed with fine pitching performances. Big Red Ruffing of the New York Yankees earned his 15th victory by shutting out the Philadelphia Athletics, 5-0, on five hits.

Fritz Ostermeier kept the Boston Red Sox tagging at the Yankees' heels with a 6-2 victory over the Washington Senators.

The Brooklyn Dodgers and Boston Bees went 14 innings yesterday. The Dodgers gave an unmerciful run in the 14th when Johnny Hudson served twice on the same play and Ed Simmons sacrificed the winning run home. The score was 4-3.

Walter Kirby Hoge, who beat the New York Giants last week with a two-hitter, did it again on five hits as the Phillies opened their series with a 5-2 triumph.

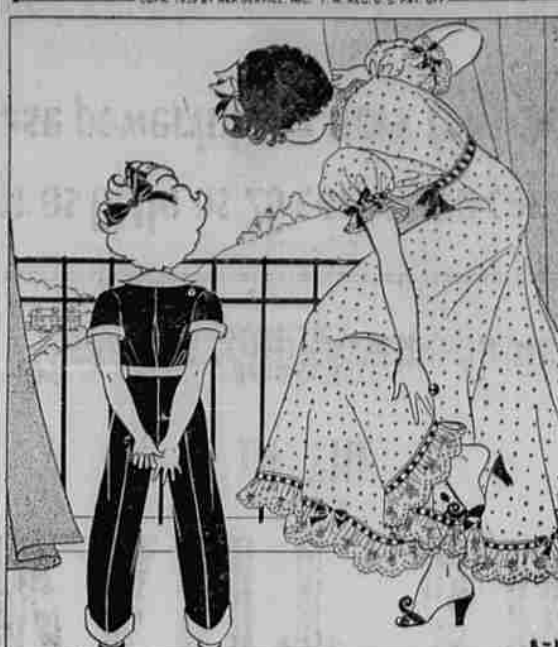

LEGION PROTESTS FOREIGN TEACHERS

SPOKANE, Aug. 19.—(AP)—The American Legion's state education commission has condemned employment in the "better positions" of eastern and foreign-born educators in a report presented to the departmental convention here.

The report said: "If it is to be continued, then it is recommended that the graduate schools at Washington State college and the University of Washington be closed in fairness to the taxpayers and the prospective student."

"The Legion strongly urges that teachers, instructors or professors teaching or instructing the youth of our state should be citizens of the United States."

"The Legion sees no reason why citizens of the United States can't be found who are qualified to teach any subject."
