FARM INCOME IN '39 TO SHOW DROP

Far Westerners Said to Be Ahead of National Average.

By WALTER WARREN SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 21.—(AP)—Far western farmers made encouraging progress in their battle for bread and beans and something to boot to pay on the mortgage in July. Federal department of agriculture figures show they led the nation's soil-tillers in boosting income from sale of farm products over last year's intake.

The 11 far western states sold \$53,777,000 worth of yield from their orchards, fields and ranges that month. It was a gain of 7 cents on the dollar income of the area from the Rockies to the Pacific.

Aid from a gain of 1 per cent in the South Atlantic states, the far west was the only region to show ahead of last year for the month. The nation's farm products sales totalled \$201,000,000, or some 13 million more than the \$187,951,000 of the 1938 half year.

The nation's farm products sales ran \$2,967,000,000 for the six months this year, compared with \$2,984,000,000 last year.

Eight of the 11 western states contributed to the region's half-year gain. They were Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Colorado, New Mexico and Utah. Slightly on the minus side was Nevada, while California and Arizona were shy some \$5,000,000 each for the half year.

California held its predominant position in the area, with \$108,748,000 sold from its diversified rubbers.

Farmers got more June dividend in Oregon, Utah, Arizona, New Mexico, Colorado, Wyoming and Montana this year than last, but fared not quite so well in Washington, Nevada and Idaho.

Taking the half year as a whole, Washington and Oregon benefited markedly from larger sales of wheat, apples, potatoes, chickens and wool, and to some extent from cattle and hogs.
