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IN 1933 the Nazis came into power
in Germany under the lead-
ership of Adolf Hitler for the
purpose of saving the
country from the communists.

August 21, 1939, German party
controlled newspapers (Nazi party,
of course) printed pictures of the
foreign ministers of Germany and
Russia side by side with this caption:
"Our picture shows Ribben-
trope and Molotov the ministers of
the countries which have decided
to return to their traditional
friendships."

Obviously the two things are
not possible if our reasoning is
based upon a sincere interpreta-
tion of European political prin-
ciples.

The cold fact is, of course, that
there is no sincerity in what the
Nazi leaders recite as their philo-
sophy of government. Nor is there
even as much sincerity in the com-
munist prattle about the brother-
hood of man.

Both states are under the abso-
lute control of cold-blooded dicta-
tors and their faithful henchmen.
All of their high sounding phrases
mean nothing. Their iron control
of their millions of people—power
—means everything to them.
Ideologically the terms commu-
nism and fascism are as wide apart
at the poles. Practically, they are
identical.

Therefore it is not one bit
strange that Stalin and Hitler can
lock arms and march at the head
of an international parade of good
will. The controlled press and the
controlled radio of the two coun-
tries will be kept busy a few days
putting out the explanations—
which will be accepted at face
value, OR ELSE!—and that will be
the end of the wonderings of the
multitude.

In order to add the whole thing
up and make the result come out
right, we must make some assump-
tions. Assumption number one is
that the above mentioned develop-
ment which is a bit bewildering to
the occidental mind is easily and
naturally understood by the orien-
tal statesmen and people. As
assumption number two is that Ger-
many has been keeping pretty
close track of the miniature war
up on the Manchurian-Russian
border and has decided that the
Russians know how to fight and
will do so if and when ordered. As-
sumption number three can well
be that the Chinese opposing the
Japanese will be called huns and
beasties in the future and will
no longer be referred to as
communists.

Swallow all of those assumptions
with one great gulp and a power
alliance is put together that en-
circles the globe and will be in
a position to dominate absolutely
everything and every person
thereon.

Accordingly there will be no war
in Europe this year or for a long
time to come. No country or
group of countries would dare
make war against so powerful a
combination as that envisioned
above. But there may be numer-
ous punitive actions against those
who in any way become antagonistic
to the great power combination.
That will not be war—according
to them it will be justified extor-
tion.

RULES GOVERNING FARM WORK GIVEN

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—(AP)—The wage-hour division of the labor department yesterday clarified for thousands of Pacific north-west workers provisions of the act in regard to seasonal and farm work.

The clarification resulted in complete exemption of thousands of workers from both wage and hour provisions, exemption of other thousands from the hour provisions only and inclusion of many border-line jobs under the act's jurisdiction.

The new rulings, in brief:
Exempted from both provisions—those raising crops and live-stock.
Exempted from maximum hour provisions—those handling and loading crops and livestock. (Exem-
ption of those handling and loading crops and livestock is not absolute and first processing of perishable or seasonal fruits and vegetables in any place of employment where the employer is engaged for not more than 14 weeks in any calendar year in such work.)

Special rulings declared persons engaged by the farmer in "prepara-
tion for market" of farm products, including assembling, binning, cleaning, grading, sorting, drying, preserving, packing, storing and canning, exempt from the entire act. Under the 14-week limit on perishables, the department pointed out the exemption is applicable only when the products handled are seasonal fruits or vegetables or perishables. (This rule, an important Oregon crop, are not exempted, nor are dried fruits or dry beans.) The department ruled storing of fruits and vegetables in a storage house does not constitute a "first processing" operation and is therefore not exempt.

ENGLAND TO FACE RAILROAD STRIKE

LONDON, Aug. 22.—(AP)—A strike on England's four main railroads effective Saturday was decided upon late today by the executive committee of the Associated Society of Locomotive Engineers and Firemen.

The strike decision followed upon failure of the companies to agree to raise the minimum weekly wage from 45 shillings (\$11.25) to 50 shillings (\$12.50).

All labor will be withdrawn, the union announced, unless an agree-
