SEES NO REASON FOR POVERTY IN OREGON

PORTLAND, Aug. 25.—(AP)—Dr. William R. Pabst, associate professor of economics at Tulane university in Louisiana, said in an interview here yesterday "labor unions are tabbed as the root of all evil by the people in New Orleans." He said he had noticed the Portland people "are more tolerant in their treatment of the rights of labor to organize." "There is a much better chance for a man to make an honest living in Oregon than in Louisiana. There should be no reason at all for poverty in Oregon," he declared.
