MORE NYA FUNDS ALLOTTED O.S.C.

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Between 450 and 500 students will receive financial help through the National Youth Administration on this campus this coming year, estimates E. B. Lemon, registrar. Under a new allotment based on 1938 enrollment, Oregon State will receive increased funds to provide work for some 80 more students than the average of \$20 per month helped last year.

Although official figures were not expected until late in August, Lemon estimated that available funds for this campus will total around \$50,000 compared with \$41,985 last year. Students earned up to \$20 per month, averaging \$12, doing many types of work for the institution.

Pending receipt of official application blanks, Lemon is making up a list of students desiring such aid to whom application blanks will be mailed as soon as the latter arrive. First day of Freshman week this year is September 25.

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RUFFING POSTS 20TH VICTORY OF SEASON

Several Other Pitchers in Majors Also Promising Fancy Records.

Before the finish, this baseball season may be notable for many things—including Joe McGraw, first 400 hitter in nine years—but it seems certain to have a bumper crop of pitchers winning 20 or more games.

In the first flush of mid-season enthusiasm over achievements of Buckie Walters, Bob Feller, Red Ruffing and their fellow tradesmen, some fans even thought a 30-game winner might pop up.

This prospect faded when Walters was stalled two weeks trying to win his 21st game for the Cincinnati Reds. However, he's about to have plenty of company in the 20-class, which last year numbered only Ruffing, Bill Lee, Buck Newsom and Paul Derringer.

Ruffing reached the goal for the fourth consecutive year yesterday as the New York Yankees tossed the Detroit Tigers, 13-7, for their ninth straight victory, extending their American league lead to 13 full games.

Feller pitched Cleveland a four-hit 10 shutout in the first game of a doubleheader against the Boston Red Sox for his 19th triumph and virtually assured himself of a berth. The Tribe also bumped Boston in the second game, 5-3, for the Sox's fifth consecutive loss.

Derringer hurled the Cincinnati Reds to a 7-2 decision over the New York Giants on six hits, bringing his total at games won to 17, within easy range of the target.

Among other pitchers aiming at the mark with good chances of hitting are Curt Davis of the St. Louis Cardinals, with 15 already won; Tommy Bridges of the Tigers and Bill Lee of the Chicago Cubs, each with 16 victories; and Buck News
