

### CARDINALS FALTER IN RUNNER-UP SPOT

The St. Louis Cardinals were handed a 2-1 setback by the Boston Red Sox yesterday, their third in four starts against Casey Stengel's slingers and their seventh in ten outings in the east.

This loss not only left the Cards 5 1/2 games back of the league-leading Cincinnati Reds, but pushed them to where they're only two games in front of the third-place Cubs. The Reds and Cubs, and every other National League club, were given a day off by Old Man Weather.

Over in the American league, the New York Yankees lost and the Boston Red Sox won, leaving the Yanks only 12 games in front.

The outstanding feature of the day was the daffy ninth inning which saw the Detroit Tigers blow a five-run lead and come right back to take the game from the world champions, 7-6. The defeat, the Yanks' first in the west, ended their ten-game winning streak.

Going into the ninth, Newsom and the Detroiters were riding along on a 6-1 edge. Then the roof fell in. Six hits, including DiMaggio's game-tying three-run homer, wiped out the entire Tiger edge. But, with Johnny Murphy doing the tossing the last of the ninth, Gehringer and Higgins treated themselves to a double apiece to push the winner across.

The Red Sox had to call on Ted Williams to turn the trick for them against the Cleveland Indians, 7-4. Lefebvre and Eisenstat were all tied up like a Christmas package in a scoreless fling duel going into the fifth. Then Eisenstat loaded the bases. Ted promptly belted a homer with "standing room only" on the base.

No other games were scheduled in the American league.

### FARM FINANCING GETS SOUND BASIS

That farmer borrowers through production credit associations are financing their operations on a sound business basis is indicated by the fact that on June 30, 1939, less than 2 per cent of the loans were delinquent 30 days. It was reported by C. R. Arnold, deputy production credit commissioner of the farm credit administration.

"During the fiscal year ending on that date the local production credit associations, numbering approximately 300, made loans totaling more than \$306,000,000," said Mr. Arnold. "Loans outstanding on July 1 aggregated \$186,900,000. There were between 250,000 and 300,000 borrowers during the year. Losses and estimated losses on the more than \$1,300,000,000 loaned by the associations since their organization are less than one-half of one per cent."

Loans under the production credit association setup are intended to supply short-term funds to bridge the periods necessary to complete the growing and marketing of crops and livestock. Money which is needed for the purchase of seed, feed, fertilizer and to meet other operating costs is made available when needed, and under repayment plans which give assurance to the borrower that he will be able to "pay out."

### TITULAR BALL PLAY TO OPEN TONIGHT

The first of a three-game series between Dunham's Transfarmers and the Elks club to determine the winner of the crown emblematic of the City Softball league championship opens tonight at Finley field at 8 o'clock. The second game will be played Friday evening at the same hour and the third and final game, if needed, is scheduled for Wednesday, September 6.

They collected 15 hits off the two Beaver twirlers, while Hal Turpin held the home club to eight.

Los Angeles blanked the Hollywood Stars, 2 to 0, as Southpaw Palm gave up only three hits to chalk up his 17th victory of the season.

Sacramento also won a shutout game, blanking San Diego 2 to 0 behind Freitas' six-hit tripling.

Oakland's cellar-dwelling Acorns slugged down the third place San Francisco Seals, 5 to 3, bunching three runs in the fifth on three hits.

BERLIN, Aug. 29.—(AP)—A hundred dollar bill, or 2,000 marks, could not buy two sticks of shaving soap, a dozen handkerchiefs or three dresses in Berlin today.

And without a letter, stamped and sealed by a Nazi authority, the richest man in Berlin couldn't buy a pair of shoes.

Many Germans, most of whom are fairly prosperous these days, learned with a jolt yesterday money is useless when a government, as determined and efficient as the reich, decides to clamp down a wartime rationing system.

A man could buy one, but not two sticks of shaving soap; but to get even that one he would have to give up a little ticket which would not be applicable for 11 months.

Any woman with two dresses couldn't buy a third.

In a situation approximating war time conditions, Nazi authorities held, two dresses are enough for a woman.
