

AMERICAN LEAGUE RACE TONES DOWN

Quality of Games Played
Lessens With Flag Safe
in Yankees' Grasp.

The race in the American league has become so dull that the teams now are playing "give-away." Even the world champion New York Yankees are taking part.

The Yankees dropped the second straight last night, in a 4-3, ten-inning debacle which must have amused the 35,000 spectators present at Cleveland, a town which by this time should have a well-developed sense of baseball humor.

Three pitchers muffed the Bronx batters with four hits, two of them bringing a run in the first inning. Trosky hit his 23rd homer with one on in the fourth to lift the Tribe in front and then the boys started to play—but not baseball.

In the seventh Gordon walked, went to second on an error, to third on a sacrifice and scored on Miller's wild pitch. In the eighth Campbell made a three-base blunder on a fly by Rolfe, who scored on a single. In the ninth Gomez walked a batter, and the bases loaded to tie the score, and in the tenth Chapman was walked by Murphy and subsequently scored the winning run on Keltner's third single.

Red Sox Muff Chance.
The Boston Red Sox passed up the chance to chase another nick in New York's 12-game lead by tossing a 7-6 decision to the Tigers although getting three home runs and outlasting Detroit, 12-8.

After Averill homered with one on in the first, the Red Sox got to Freddy Hutchinson in the third and fourth for a three-run homer by Ted Williams and eleven clouts by Taber and Berg, the latter's first home run since 1935.

Detroit got back two runs on one hit in the sixth and won the game in the eighth with three runs on two walks and two singles. Williams letting the second of these get through him.

A's Win Twin Bill.
The Philadelphia Athletics took a doubleheader from the St. Louis Browns, 3-2 and 2-1, cramming nine runs into the seventh inning of the first game with Sam Chapman getting a home run and a double and Hayes hitting a homer with two on.

The Chicago White Sox and Washington Senators divided a double bill. The veteran Ted Lyons returned to the lineup after being out 15 days and pitched a four-hit, 5-2 victory for the Sox in the opener. Krakauskas won the afterpiece, 4-3, with seventh-inning hit.

All the games in the National league were rained out.

**GIANTS EVEN GRID
SERIES WITH STARS**

CHICAGO, Aug. 31. (AP)—Touchdowns or no touchdowns, football's professional champions now are even with the college All-Stars in their six-year-old series of pre-season charity battles.

The New York Giants, pro-champions, gave the All-Stars a sound lesson in gridiron versatility last night before 31,454 customers to win, 9-6, on three field goals.

This was the second time the pro-champions defeated the collegians, chosen for the game from 1933's seniors in a nationwide poll, and the second time they did it without a touchdown. In 1935, the Chicago Bears won, 5-0.

The series now stands all square at two victories apiece and two ties.

The All-Stars' vaunted passing attack, starting such notable amateurs as Davey O'Brien of Texas

Christian, Sid Luckman of Columbia, Billy Patterson of Baylor and Johnny Pingel of Michigan State never quite came off. Each time the college boys began to roll toward an alert Giant squelched the threat with a pass interception.

**LOS ANGELES GAINS
GAME ON SEATTLE**

Seattle's lead at the top of the Pacific Coast league baseball heap was trimmed to seven and a half games last night, and the high-flying Rainier couldn't do a thing about it.

Second-place Los Angeles plastered a 12-6 defeat on Hollywood at the Angels' lot, while Seattle's game with Portland at the latter's park was rained out.

Los Angeles collected 18 hits off three Hollywood pitchers. Six of them were in the second inning and accounted for five runs at the expense of Ardizzone, who gave way to Muncie in the third.

It was the Angels' second straight win over the Stars, and put Hollywood down a notch into sixth place.

The last-place Oakland A's also won their second in a row over third-place San Francisco, nipping the Seals at their own park, 7 to 6, with a splurge that brought in two runs in the eighth and three in the ninth.

At San Diego, the San Diego Padres evened their series score with Sacramento by beating the Senators, 5 to 11, behind Newsum's smooth pitching.
