

New, Modern Service Station Will Open Saturday

HANCOCK PRODUCTS TO BE DISTRIBUTED

Retail Trade to Be Served
in Addition to General
Fuel Supplying.

Built to accommodate retail trade as well as serving as a distributing center for the Roseburg area, a company-owned Hancock station will be opened Saturday at the junction of the Pacific highway and Garden valley road.

The new, thoroughly modern service station will be under the supervision of J. D. Myers, distributor for the Roseburg district. A station for the retail sale of Hancock products also is maintained at Stephens and Mosher streets Roseburg, under the management of George Hinsdale.

Facilities at the new plant, which is situated only a short distance north of the city limits, provide for underground storage of more than 16,000 gallons of fuel and lubricants.

In addition to the regular grades of gasoline, the station will be distributing center for kerosene, diesel oil, stove oil, industrial oil and a full line of greases.

Everything Modern. The retail features of the new station provide the latest types of gasoline pumps, convenient drive-in space, a neat office, large and well furnished rest room, a well arranged office and sales room, and numerous other conveniences.

The station was built by Contractor Walter Kinsey, the building was in charge of D. V. Rast and the electrical work was done by E. M. Golden, all of Roseburg.

Mr. Myers will be assisted in the management of the station by L. S. Kershner, who for many years has been identified with garage and service station activities in Roseburg.

Wherever the boys get around to awarding their gold palms this fall for meritorious service on baseball's firing line they would do well to start with a happy old warrior named Emil (Dutch) Leonard.

Pitching for the sixth-place Washington Senators in the American league, the 29-year-old knuckleball expert held the Chicago White Sox to six hits last night to win his 16th game of the season, 4-3.

The Yankees were idle yet nevertheless added half a game to their lead as the nose-diving Boston Red Sox dropped another to Detroit, 11-4. The Tigers batted old Moses Grove out in the sixth for his third defeat and continued a 13-hit assault on three other hurlers.

The Philadelphia Athletics took their third straight from the lovely St. Louis Browns, 4-2, with Wally Moses accounting for all the winners' runs. Moses led off with a double and scored in the first frame and then hit a homer with two on in the fourth.

Rain again washed out all the National league games except a double-header between the Pittsburgh Pirates and Philadelphia Phillies, which they graciously divided.

Max Batcher, the big right-hander acquired by the Buccaneers recently from the tail-enders, turned on his old teammates with a five-hit pitching chore which bettered Kirby Higbe's six-hit job and won the first game 1-0. In the second contest the Phils unleashed a 14-hit attack on four Pirate pitchers to win 11-6.

34 COUNTIES LISTED IN 4-H FAIR EXHIBIT

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 1.—Four-H clubbers from every county in Oregon, except Jefferson and Grant, are represented in entries for the 4-H departments at the Oregon state fair which opens here Labor day, L. J. Allen, assistant state club leader, informed fair officials yesterday. Those counties may send in later entries.

Highlight in new activities for 4-Hers this year will be the dairy cattle judging contest the opening day, in which 16 counties have entered teams to select the Oregon 4-H representatives for the national dairy contest at the Golden Gate exposition. Twenty-five counties have teams entered in the 4-H livestock judging contest which is an annual event.

An innovation this fair is the 4-H livestock auction sale, to be conducted Friday morning at 10 o'clock in the 4-H club barns with Ben Sudtall of Albany the auctioneer. Stock has been sold previously, but not as a public auction, and it is expected this event will attract considerable attention.

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OAKS BOUNCE FROM CELLAR TO SPOT 5

Oakland jumped from the Coast league cellar to a tie with San Diego for fifth place last night.

As the Oaks moved up past Portland and Hollywood by beating San Francisco 3 to 1, the top-place Seattle Sols and Portland were rained out.

Second place Los Angeles, thanks to the rain at Portland and its 2 to 1 triumph over Hollywood, cut the Seattle margin in the standings to 7 games. Hollywood replaced Oakland in the basement. Sacramento, chasing San Francisco for third place, downed San Diego 4 to 3.

The Oaks' victory, with Ralph Buxton limiting San Francisco to five hits, was their third straight over the Sols.

English's ninth-inning single, scoring Johnny Moore, gave Los Angeles its victory over the Stars.

Sacramento also won its game with San Diego in the final frame with a three-run rally, which resulted from Shortstop Griffiths' error. San Diego scored twice in the last of the ninth but Sols snuffed out the rally by fanning Carlyle for the third out.

RECREATION NEWS

Douglas County Conditions
Summarized in Forestry
Service Bulletin.

The smoke which filled the air over the Umpqua national forest a week ago has been replaced by fog and drizzling rain. The fire guards of the forest service are relaxing at last after days on end when for 14, 16, 18 hours at a stretch they battled with raging flames. Rain never was more welcome. However, it should be remembered that the fire season is not over until the fall rains set in in earnest. September often is the worst fire month of the year. Forest protection laws still are in effect. Do not smoke while traveling forest roads or trails. Campfire permits must be secured. Campers outside improved posted forest camps are required by Oregon law to carry axe, shovel and water bucket.

Diamond Lake District. Snow flurries have occurred on Bailey and Rattlesnake mountains. At Diamond lake the nights have been cold, but there still are approximately 50 recreationists at the lodge and in camps. Fishing is reported to be fair, with an occasional limit catch being reported from the streams of the area. The campground roads have been oiled and are now open again. The road west from Big Camas to Shuff Camp is closed.

North Umpqua District. Steelhead fishing in the North Umpqua is somewhat improved over a week ago, but is still not standard. Some of the old-timers on the river predict that the change of weather will result in better fishing during the next ten days. Trout fishing is good in the North Umpqua; poor in the small tributary streams. Roads are in good condition.

South Umpqua District. The extraordinary fire situation in this district, in which over 1200 men were employed in fire suppression, has made it difficult to secure recreational news. No one in the district has been interested in fishing. Last reports were that fishing is poor, and it is unlikely that there has been any appreciable change. All roads are reported to be open.

Bohemian District. Fishing is still reported to be poor, with no prospect of any improvement this season. Roads are open and in fair condition.—Umpqua National Forest.
