EASTERN OREGON'S PRUNE CROP VALUED

The first growers' pool brought \$20 a ton and the last \$5 but the average held near \$18. Between \$50 and 200 cars were moved compared with the pre-season estimate of 600 to 700. The runover was largely responsible for the price decline.
