COMMISSIONER HIT BY P. U. D. RULING

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 8.—(AP)—County commissioners cannot serve as directors of people's utility districts because of a constitutional provision that no person may hold two lucrative public offices, Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle ruled today for District Attorney John Baker of Hood River county.

Baker said that a Hood River county commissioner qualified as a director of the PUD in that county, but the attorney general held that the office of county commissioner must be declared vacant, even though the commissioner agreed to serve in one of the two offices without compensation.

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
