

RUMANIAN PREMIER VICTIM OF MURDER

riddled his chest and abdomen from side to side. He was killed instantly. The shots were fired at 2:10 p. m. Bucharest time (1:10 a. m., P. S. T.).

Assassins Arrested

Eight of the alleged assassins and accomplices have been arrested. The troops were called to surround their cells and public buildings and to guard against any attempt at a coup.

While the assassins were carrying out their assignment another band of armed, masked men seized the Bucharest radio station, shouting and sending the announcer and interrupting the scheduled program.

Then one of them announced that Calinescu had been killed in revolt.

Police rushed immediately to the scene of the shooting, where two of the alleged killers were arrested.

Meanwhile Romanian authorities quickly clamped on rigid censorship until all the facts were established.

Diplomats here said they interpreted the assassination of their premier as "highly significant just at the moment when German and Russian troops are approaching Rumania's northern frontier."

"Maybe the murder of Calinescu is only the beginning of something much bigger," one Romanian official said.

These Rumanians disclosed the Bucharest government had suppressed rightly news of iron guard agitation throughout Rumania which they said began as soon as German forces began their eastward march through Poland near the Rumanian border.

In reports of pro-Nazi agitation in Rumania it was recalled that just yesterday a Rumanian official at Cornant disclosed police arrested a group of German residents of the boyina province on charges they plotted a revolt to join Germany if Nazi troops in Poland arrived at the Rumanian frontier.

Calinescu frequently had charged the iron guard was financed and given orders by Berlin.

King Also in Peril

Calinescu became head of the government March 20, 1939, succeeding the late Dr. Miron Cristea, patriarch of the Rumanian church, who had created a national government.

On June 17 police announced that iron guardists had planned to assassinate Calinescu as well as the king with hand grenade at a race track.

That plot was said to have been organized to avenge the death of Cornelia Codreanu, iron guard leader who was killed in a reported attempt to escape prison on November 30.

Calinescu had been one of King Carol's mainstays in effecting governmental changes under which the king became a virtual dictator. Calinescu was comparatively young for the premiership—46.

which those "safeguards" should be set up—"so long as the method chosen will meet the needs of now and changing day to day situations and dangers."

"To those who say that this program would involve a step toward war on our part," the chief executive asserted, "I reply that it offers far greater safeguards than we now possess or have ever possessed to protect American lives and property from danger."

"It is a positive program for giving safety. This means less likelihood of incidents and controversies which tend to draw us into conflict, as they did in the last war."

"There lies the road to peace." After relating steps already taken to strengthen the nation's defenses, Mr. Roosevelt said he saw no need for additional legislation nor for further executive action under his proclamation of a limited state of national emergency.

Mr. Roosevelt said the executive branch of the government had done its utmost, within a traditional policy of non-involvement, "to aid in averting the present appalling war."

"Having thus striven and failed," he said, "this government must lose no time or effort to keep the nation from being drawn into the war."

Here he predicted success "in these efforts."

War Effect Unavoidable

Before closing, the president expressed his desire to be able to "offer the hope that the shadow over the world light swiftly pass." But he said:

"I cannot. The facts compel my stating with candor, that darker periods may lie ahead."

Monroe Doctrine Backed

A moment later he asserted: "I urge now to counsel us to assume the task of helping to maintain in the western world a citadel wherein that civilization may be kept alive. The peace, the integrity and the safety of the Americas—these must be kept firm and serene."

Thus the president, for some of his audience, gave reassurances that the United States would stand firmly behind the Monroe doctrine.

His message also gave his backing to the neutrality proposals transmitted to congress at its last session by Secretary Hull.

Opponents Map Battle

Before Mr. Roosevelt drove to the capitol to address the congress, called together only seven weeks after adjourning the regular session, 17 senators opposed to repeal of the arms embargo met to plan their strategy of opposition to revision of the neutrality act.

Republicans present included Horat of Idaho, Vandenberg of Michigan, Nye of North Dakota, Johnson of California, Gurney of South Dakota, Tobey of New Hampshire, Chandler of Connecticut, and Capner of Kansas.

Democrats present were Clark of Missouri, McCarran of Nevada, Holt of West Virginia, and Bulow of South Dakota. Others were Shipstead and Lundeen, farmer laborites of Minnesota, and La Follette, Wisconsin progressive.

GERMANS EXPECT POLISH RESISTANCE TO DIE DOWN

BERLIN, Sept. 21.—(AP)—The army high command reported today only four swarms of resistance in Poland and Germans expected they would fall without shelling.

The command's belief the remaining resistance was negligible already had been indicated by the departure for the western front of Col. Gen. Von Brauchitsch, commander of the German army, to assume direction of the struggle against Great Britain and France.

German officers indicated no lightning strokes against these centers were planned, but rather, since they are surrounded, that the feeling is time will work for Germany and the Poles will surrender.

Think Warsaw Doomed

One of the generals in Reichsfuehrer Hitler's entourage, discussing the situation of Warsaw, said on Tuesday:

"Our Fuehrer does not think it worth while to risk the life of a single German soldier to take Warsaw. Cut off on all sides it has no alternative save to surrender. Why, then, should we shell it and give food—though unjustified—to anti-German propaganda that we are firing on women and children?"

Military men said the same feeling applied to the other remaining islands of resistance.

Well-informed Berlin sources at related Germany's failure to deliver Warsaw a knockout blow to a desire to refrain from offending world opinion while the United States congress is considering neutrality problems.

AIR VICTORIES CLAIMED BY BRITISH, FRENCH FLIERS

PARIS, Sept. 21.—(AP)—Military dispatches today reported French and British air pilots had brought down an undetermined number of German planes in the past few days in a series of victorious dogfights with German fliers over the western front.

French communique, military sources said, have been limited only to those enemy planes which have fallen behind the French lines. They said the number of Germans who crashed was known to be "substantially more."

A German high army command communique issued today in Berlin reported eight enemy warplanes and three captive balloons shot down on the western front.

French "Threatener" War dispatches said the French army was threatening approaches to Zweibruecken, Germany, at the

upper end of the Biles river valley. These advisers reported French advance units had fought numerous pitched battles with German patrols in the Zweibruecken zone and further west, near Saarbruecken, another German city which the French were attempting to surround.

Zweibruecken, about 16 miles from Saarbruecken, lies five miles within Germany and Saarbruecken two miles.

These reports indicated each side was seeking prisoners in the gun-barricading zone between the northern reaches of the Marston and Slegfried lines from whom to pry secrets of strategy and troop disposition.

gave foreign correspondents a vigorous denial of allegations that Germany intended to violate the neutrality of Belgium, The Netherlands or Luxembourg.

"I am in a position to give a categorical, unequivocal and unconditional denial," said the propa-

ganda minister in his first appearance before foreign newspapermen since Germany started her invasion of Poland Sept. 1.

"The German government never had, does not have now nor intends in the future to violate the neutrality either of Belgium, Holland or Luxembourg."
