Gold Star Mothers Honored

Yesterday morning, the American Legion and its auxiliary met with the Methodist church and friends from other churches for a most impressive ceremony honoring Gold Star Mothers of the world war. These are the mothers whose sons were killed during the war.

The ceremony included: prelude, choir procession; call to worship; collect; anthem; responsive reading; song; scripture lesson; President Franklin Roosevelt's Gold Star day proclamation, read by Dr. Louis Magin; silent prayer; anthem; sermon, "Under the Shadow of War," by Dr. Magin; recognition of Gold Star Mothers of the world war; solo, "Mother Machine," sung by J. P. Sage; benediction and postlude.

The Rev. Dr. Louis Magin delivered the address on the text taken from Isaiah 26:15, for thus said the Lord Jehovah—in quietness and in confidence shall be your strength. This admonition was given to the people of Israel 2700 years ago, he said. Your safety, the Israelites were told, lies not in alliances, it applies today, Dr. Magin stated. The next war, he said, will be more bloody, more brutal, more costly, more expensive than the last. \$25,000 was the price each boy killed cost the government in the war, which our boys engaged. Multiply this by 10,000, he said, and what have you? The present conflict is caused by the follies and sins of Europe. The common people do not want war, they hate it, he said. There are forces at work to get us into war today, he stated. Dr. Magin, he said, says we as people should turn off our radios if need be, or listen less, for we must guard against hysteria in the U. S. We must be careful, Dr. Magin urged, that our boys do not follow our munitions to the front. The world needs America, he said, to keep it out of war, to teach the brotherhood of man, the fatherhood of God. I am glad, said Dr. Magin, that the American Legion went on record in its Chicago convention as being in favor of keeping out of war. America should put her money into relieving suffering, we should put our own hands to order, he said. We should teach the world we can dwell as brothers, not as fighters. Our problem is to teach the world we have brotherhood at home, then teach that to the world. Prayer, said Dr. Magin, is a greater force than arms. We need to know the value of united prayer in an hour like this. A great leader of Europe says that the lights of Europe are going out. The lights of education, social service, science, philosophy, brotherhood, lights going out? Thank God, he said, not the light of Christ, which will never go out.

"The wrong shall fail. The right prevail. Of peace on earth. Of good will to men." Dr. Magin quoted the greatest battle ever fought. "It was fought by the mothers of men." God could not be everywhere so he made mothers, he said, the tenderness of their touch and the remembrance of their prayers will never be forgotten. The Legionnaires then presented the mothers at the altar, where they received from Dr. Magin on behalf of the Legion auxiliary, corsages of golden flowers tied with golden ribbons. 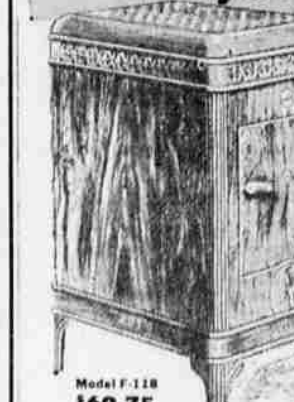
