

Pitching Problem Worrying Yankees

RUFFING'S ARM NOT IN BEST OF SHAPE

Gomez, With Injured Side, May Not Start at All; Pearson Best Bet.

NEW YORK, Oct. 2. (AP)—A pitching problem of all things, the New York Yankees manager, Charles D. Murphy, today said the team's pitching staff was in the best of shape for the 1939 season. Murphy, who started the first game of the series last year, also opened the all-star game for the American league in July, has had an arm ailment. He vowed he was ready to work, but up until the Yankees struggled onto the swing turn of Yankee stadium for practice today. Manager Joe McCarthy had not decided whether to lead with his arm.

Ruffing has not thrown a ball since the middle of September when the last place St. Louis Browns checked 12 hits off him in less than nine innings. Ruffing is made at least one recent trip to a hospital in Brooklyn and may or may not have reached the physical fitness he proclaimed.

Pearson May Start Off
McCarthy, like a lot of other persons, wished he could be sure. If the Yankee skipper should decide to hold back Ruffing, he undoubtedly would open with Pearson, who won one game in each of the last three world series for the Yankees.

Pearson's record of 12 victories and five defeats was dwarfed by his 21 and seven, but he finished strong.

Letty Gomez, just out of a hospital and still taped on her back and arm, where she sustained a muscle, did not raise consideration for the first two games, and his appearance at any time during the series was in doubt.

He has won six world series games with never a setback and in the Yankees original plans was figured upon for the second game pitching spot.

Holbrook and Ruffing, well-seasoned veterans, were in line for a starting call somewhere along the line. Ruffing, Donald and Russo, a southpaw, likewise were potential starters. If McCarthy should need to dip deep into his staff, it seemed likely that Sumner, Murphy and Chandler would be held strictly for relief purposes.

Derringer 1st Choice
The Reds arranged to follow the Yankees onto the stadium field this afternoon for a final workout. Manager McKeithen already had settled on Paul Derringer to lead the first game for the National league champions.

Backy Walters, the converted infielder who combined with Derringer to win 52 games during the season, was certain of the second game assignment. Thoms, two and Gene Thompson, 27-year-old rookie who finished the season with two consecutive shutouts, were also the choices to work the two or three games that will be played in Cincinnati starting Saturday.

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COAL-LABOR WAR IN KENTUCKY ENDS

LONDON, Ky., Oct. 2.—(AP)—Judge H. Clark Ford today dismissed federal charges against 32 Hardin county coal companies and individuals that they conspired to deprive miners of their rights under the Wagner labor relations act.

The original indictment was against 60 defendants but charges were dropped previously against five companies and four officers. Six defendants died and two are in state institutions.

The action today followed the dismissal Friday of indictments against more than 100 persons in Harlan circuit court on charges arising from labor disturbances last spring.

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WORLD SERIES, PAST AND NOW, ON KNRR

Bob Elson and Red Barber are extremely baseball-conscious these days, despite the fact that the regular major league season is drawing to a close. Bob and Red are the two sports announcers chosen to broadcast the 1939 world series between the New York Yankees and the National League winner over the exclusive facilities of KNRR and the Mutual Broadcasting system.

In addition to their daily task of presenting play-by-play descriptions of baseball games in Chicago and New York, the two sports reporters are working overtime looking up records of past world series, of players, listening to recordings of other years, and checking with the officers of the two leagues and Judge Landis, high commissioner of baseball. From all this work will come a complete picture of the post-season classic, which will be heard on KNRR starting Wednesday, Oct. 4, at 10:15 a. m., PST, from the Yankee stadium.

The information gathered in these weeks of work will be used to supplement the seemingly inexhaustible store of information already possessed by both Bob Elson and Red Barber. There is no pause to look in record books while on the air. Years of experience have made both men leaders in their field. Elson entered radio in 1927, joined WGN, Chicago a year later. Barber, now with WOR, has broadcast a lot of baseball in the deep south and from Cincinnati.

SACTOS GAIN EDGE ON LOS ANGELES

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 2.—(AP)—The Los Angeles baseball team, if it wants to cut off \$5,000 as its share of the Pacific Coast league president's cup play-off series, will have to take both ends of a double header tonight from the Sacramento Senators.

Knocks Crown Off Head of Apostoli

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—(AP)—The long trail has ended for Cefirino Garcia, the two-fisted whirlwind from Los Angeles, but not at the original destination.

Thrice thwarted in bids for the world welterweight title, the Filipino won the world middleweight crown as recognized in New York and California, last night by winning a technical knockout over Fred Apostoli of San Francisco after 2:07 of the seventh round of a bitter slugfest match.

Garcia carried the message with a machine-gun series of rights and lefts which sent the belated titleholder down twice in the seventh before Referee Billy Cavanaugh, with Apostoli down a third time, waved Garcia away and ended the fight.

Garcia is recognized as champion only in New York and California. Al Hostak of Seattle is recognized in the other states.

Garcia weighed 153½, Apostoli weighed the limit of 160 after being given time to peel off a half pound he was overweight at the original weighing-in.

STATE CORN SHOW RULES ARE ISSUED

Five hundred dollars in prize money, four additional championship cups, and an accompanying educational program are factors which those in charge believe will make the third annual Oregon State corn show at Corvallis November 28 to December 2, by far the highest and best yet held.

The detailed premium list for the show has just been published by the committee and is available for free distribution either through county extension offices or direct from the extension service at O. S. C.

Although the two big public days of the show have been set for December 1 and 2, the dates will include from Tuesday, November 28, through the week, as arrangements have been made for all exhibits to be sent in by Monday night, after which they will be placed and judged before the two final program days.

There will be four classes in the show this year, consisting of an open class, a 4-H club class, an FFA class, and a class for the state hybrid corn growing contest. 4-H or FFA members may exhibit in either their own class or in the open class, but cannot enter both.

For competitive purposes the state is also divided into four districts, one in each of the four corners of the state, including all counties east of the Cascade with the exception of Hood River.

Rules provide that any yellow corn grown in Oregon during the current year may be exhibited. An exhibit of corn consists of exactly 10 ears, with the exception of those entered in the separate state hybrid

corn growing contest, where different rules apply.

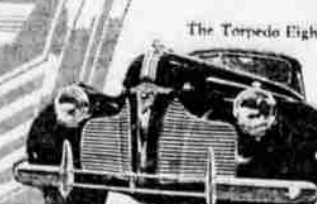
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
