STATE PRESIDENT IS HONORED BY JUNIOR WOMEN'S CLUB MONDAY

Mrs. Elsie Peterson, president of the state Federation of Women's clubs, addressed members of the Roseburg Junior Women's club Monday evening at 8 o'clock at the clubhouse. She urged the club members to work and pray for peace in America and in the world at large.

She explained that the world would not be in its present state if the population would return to the old type of living and God.

Mrs. Peterson gave a brief review of her trip to Washington, D.C., and the reception when she met Franklin Roosevelt. She spoke briefly also of the 50th anniversary which is to be celebrated by the federation during 1940-41. A suggestion made to the club members was that the members correspond with one of the 20 junior clubs organized in foreign countries.

The state president explained that the president makes trips about the country in order to learn about club work so she may return home and be better able to cope with the problems at home.

Mrs. Emily T. Mullins, state head of the fine arts department, outlined the year's work, which is based on "American Culture." The department will study arts and crafts during 1939-1940 and poetry, literature and drama of the same period. She touched on the golden jubilee celebration and suggested that the local club work, which is to be given for the outstanding song, march and flower entered in the national contest.

Mrs. W. S. Nicholson, state chairman of the international relations department, was introduced by Mrs. Walter Fisher, and gave a short talk on her department. She was accompanied to Roseburg by her daughter, Mrs. Howard Morse, who also attended the meeting.

During the business session the Junior club women voted to back the proposed swimming pool as the club's local project for 1940-41. Marshall Peters gave a brief synopsis of the swimming pool project, stating that \$400 in cash was in the bank to date, and that \$150 had been pledged. He commended the club on the suggested project and said that the choice of the club was a great step in favor of the proposed pool.
