MISSING AUTHOR ADJUDGED "DEAD"

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Oct. 5.—(AP)—Richard Halliburton, 39-year-old adventure-lecturer-author ("Royal Road to Romance" and others), is legally dead.

Born at Memphis, educated at Princeton, Halliburton set out from New Orleans 18 years ago determined to realize fabulous exploits of history and legend.

He swam the Hellespont. He traced the travels of Ulysses. He rode, as Hannibal did, elephants over the Alps. There were many other feats.

Last spring Halliburton sailed in a Chinese junk from Hong Kong for San Francisco. The junk never made port.

Yesterday a jury hearing a suit involving his insurance decided the junk went down in a typhoon, carrying Halliburton to his death—March 23 or 24.

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EX-LAND AGENT OF S. P. CO. DIES HERE

Samuel C. Bruce, 72, died at his home, 518 S. Stephens street, last night, following a short illness.

Born at Pittsburgh, Pa., Jan. 23, 1867, Mr. Bruce served for more than 20 years as a land agent for the Southern Pacific company. He was retired last year and came to Roseburg from San Francisco to make his home.

Surviving are his wife, Mable Owen Bruce, and the following brothers and sisters: Scott A. Bruce, Monroe Wash.; Mrs. S. Fuller, Portland; William D. Bruce, Ferguson Falls; Miss Bruce, Sulphur, Minn.; Luella Holden, St. Paul, Minn.; J. Z. Bruce, Baker, Ore.; May E. Bruce, Pittsburg.

The body will be taken to Portland Saturday morning by M. E. Ritter of the Roseburg Undertaking company, and services will be held at Lincoln Memorial park chapel Saturday at 2 p.m., under the auspices of the Christian Science church.

Mr. Bruce was a member of the Masonic lodge at Redding, Calif.
