

SEAS OFF EUROPE FILLED WITH MINES

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—(AP)—Nearly two score warnings to shipping have been received here from European states in the first month of the war, the state department disclosed today.

The latest was the one early this week from Germany, bidding American ships to avoid "suspicious behavior" in French and English waters and advising them against accepting convoys, zig-zagging, traveling without lights, and refusing to stop if summoned.

Germany has also given notice of mined areas in parts of the Baltic sea.

Secretary Hall notified belligerents yesterday that the United States would not countenance indiscriminate warfare against American shipping, but he also warned American vessels to keep out of the seas adjacent to Europe.

France informed the state department that its navigational lights are being discontinued, that no foreign ships were to come within the three-mile limit without special permission or within six miles from a half dozen designated sailing ports.

Vessels going to France are required to "check in" at Cape Alpech for instructions. The waters at Marseilles have been mined.

Great Britain gave notice of the discontinuance of many navigational lights. She said mines had been distributed in the Straits of Dover, the Firth of Forth, Heligoland Bight, and other localities.

Notices of restriction also have come from Egypt, Canada, Denmark, Latvia and Soviet Russia.

Mr. Rodeheaver is best known as a leader of music. He has faced more and larger audiences around the world than most any other leader. For twenty years he traveled with Billy Sunday as the musical director of tabernacle evangelistic meetings.

Master of any situation in groups large or small, Mr. Rodeheaver is noted for his rare ability in inducing those groups to sing heartily. With his famous trombone, his ready smile and his keen wit, he can sway any audience.
