

BUSINESS HELP IN PRICE FUSS SOUGHT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4.—(AP)—The commerce department's business advisory council agreed today to ask private business to join in a voluntary campaign to prevent unwarranted price increases in this country as a result of the European war.

During the first fall meeting of the council, composed of 60 industrial and financial leaders, a department spokesman announced that council members had agreed to "act as liaison between the department and industrial and business groups" on the price problem.

It was indicated the group would appoint committees to watch price movements and to contact the businessmen in fields where prices may soar.

The move was the second formal undertaking by the administration to establish a measure of control over domestic prices, which rose so quickly in some fields after the war outbreak that protests poured into Washington and the president and other officials issued warnings.

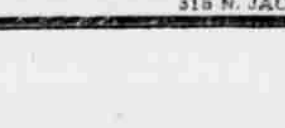

KILLER ADJUDGED INSANE AND SAVED

SALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 4.—(AP)—George Hayes, dead trapper-killer, escaped the Utah firing squad today when the state board of pardons commuted his death sentence to life imprisonment.

Hayes, who with two others now serving prison terms, was convicted of slaying Sherman W. Caldwell, 71, Tooele county recluse, in his mountain cabin last January, was judged medically insane.

Under Utah law, an insane man cannot be executed.

SOLDIERS ON FURLOUGH

Adelbert K. Armitage, son of Mrs. Alice R. Ambrose, Yoncalla, who is serving as a member of Company A, 7th Infantry at Vancouver barracks, Washington, has been granted a furlough of 30 days for the purpose of visiting his home and points in California, according to information received today from H. D. Bagnall, army recruiting officer, Portland.

Major Bagnall said the regulations of the army require that each soldier be given 30 days furlough each year on full pay and allowances provided such furlough is desired by the soldier.

Armitage enlisted in the United States army on October 18, 1938.

EMBARGO THREAT WRITERS LIABLE

PORTLAND, Oct. 4.—(AP)—A postoffice department solicitor advised Postmaster E. T. Hedlund today persons who sent cards threatening congressmen with defeat at the polls if they voted for repeal of the arms embargo were liable to criminal prosecution.

The cards, Solicitor Vincent M. Niles wrote, should be treated under section 599 of the 1932 postal laws and regulations dealing with obscene, indecent and threatening mailed matter. The act provides a fine of \$5000, five years in prison or both.

Hundreds of cards were mailed from here recently opposing neutrality law changes.

PLANE FALLS INTO TOWN; FLIER DIES

BROWNSVILLE, Ky., Oct. 4.—(AP)—One army aviator was killed and another injured seriously today when a plane from Bowman field, Louisville, crashed in the heart of Brownsville and burned.

Perry Melton, Brownsville newspaperman, said the dead man was First Lieut. Lawrence Moran of Louisville and the injured man

was a private. The plane was carrying 10 passengers and the pilot.

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URGES OUSTER OF KUHN AND BRIDGES

CINCINNATI, Oct. 4.—(AP)—Lewis G. Hines, secretary of labor and industry for Pennsylvania, urged the American Federation of Labor yesterday to demand of the federal government "that the Nazi band and the communist party be immediately liquidated" in this country.

In a speech that brought shouts and applause from the delegates, Hines struck out at Fritz Kuhn, band leader, and Harry Bridges, coast CEO director against whom the government has instituted deportation proceedings.

"If I were secretary of labor in the federal government," said Hines, "I would immediately deport Harry Bridges and find a way to strip Kuhn of his citizenship and send him back to Germany."

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
