

SAFETY ZONE PLAN MAY BE DIFFICULT

LONDON, Oct. 5.—(AP)—British naval quarters declared today the smaller American republics might find it virtually impossible to establish effective control in carrying out the safety zone project agreed upon in Panama.

Only the United States, with a large and powerful navy, might be able to enforce the plan around its own coasts. A spokesman said turning to the British fleet today by an "armored carrier" off the coast of Brazil. The spokesman said all three of Germany's "pocket battleships" must certainly be in Germany at the outbreak of the war.

Survivors have identified the raider as the 10,000-ton pocket battleship Admiral Scheer.

If any one of the three ships of this type was responsible for the attack on the Clontarf, the spokesman said the most likely vessel would be slipping through the British blockade of the North sea.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—(AP)—British Ambassador Lord Lothian asked Secretary Hull today for a clarification of the neutrality laws created around most of the new world by the Inter-American conference at Panama.

SUGAR BEET CROP VALUE TO BE UPPED

SALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 5.—(AP)—A United States sugar beet crop \$5,000 tons smaller than in 1938 will be worth \$15,000,000 more than last year if present price conditions continue, leaders of the industry predicted today.

Using their estimates on a survey of 17 beet-producing states, they placed probable worth of the 1939 crop at \$203,000,000 compared with \$198,000,000 in 1938.

Production was estimated at 1,600,000 tons compared with 1,550,000 tons in 1938.

Nine inter-mountain and Pacific coast states, which produce approximately 71 per cent of the nation's beet sugar, will refine an estimated 21,240,000 hundred-pound bags this year compared with 24,520,000 last season.

Fifty-five factories in Utah, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Oregon, Washington, California, Colorado and South Dakota will operate an average of 80 days each, providing a payroll for growers, field and factory workers that will aggregate \$21,000,000.

BUCK DEER PRESENTS HIMSELF TO NIMROD

TACOMA, Oct. 5.—(AP)—Comes now a story to rankle the hearts of deerlayers who tramped the woods for days and either came back empty handed or had to lug a carcass miles across tough country.

Disgusted after hunting three days in the Chelan district without even seeing a deer, Mr. and Mrs. J. V. Newman of Tacoma returned to their automobile. As they came into the clearing, Newman spotted a five-point buck. He shot the animal and it rolled down to the side of the car. All Newman had to do was hoist it on the car's luggage rack. The five-pointer weighed 267 pounds dressed.

U. S. SQUADRON ON WAY TO HAWAII

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Oct. 5.—(AP)—Led by the aircraft carrier Antelope, its huge flight deck bristling with fighting planes, the navy's "security patrol squadron"

got under way this morning for Hawaii.

Some 24 ships were expected to leave this port, joining with six heavy cruisers from San Pedro. Included were 18 destroyers, one light cruiser and four tenders and mine sweepers.

WALNUT PROGRAM GIVEN APPROVAL

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—(AP)—Secretary Wallace announced today final approval of amendments to a federal marketing program fixing at 60 per cent the amount of this year's west coast walnut crop which may be sold.

The amendments were approved in a recent referendum by growers in California, Washington and Oregon.

Growers must withhold 40 per cent of this year's crop as surplus above anticipated market needs.

PORTLAND, Oct. 5.—(AP)—The Walnut Growers' association announced today California prices were one cent a pound lower on medium grade compared with the 1938 quotations and two cents lower on other grades.

The California quotations included Diamond No. 1, 12 1/2; Emerald No. 1, 12 1/2; Diamond large Franquettes 13 1/2; Emerald large Franquettes 13 1/2; all free on board California shipping points.
