Walls, outlined a part of the annual program stressing enrollment in the P.T.A., correspondence course, and the importance of maintaining a friendly attitude toward our teachers and endeavoring to make them as individuals in order that there may be closer cooperation between the school and the home, which is being stressed in the local organization.

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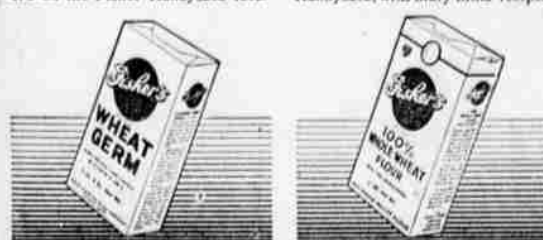
