

Warriors of R. H. S. Face First Test

INDIANS TO MEET REEDSPORT ELEVEN

**Tough Opponent in Battle
Tomorrow Has Already
Downed 2 Teams.**

The Roseburg high school Indian football team will meet tomorrow morning, when they hit the warpath trail to test their strength for the first time this season against a strong tribe of Chinooks from Reedspoint high school on the lower Umpqua gridiron tomorrow afternoon.

Couch Jim Watts' warriors have worked hard for the last three weeks preparing for the opening game for the locals in the new Lane-Douglas football league. The squad has looked great in practice, but Watts is making no prediction as to the probable outcome of the game because his charges are going in against an imposing array of lettersmen. In number, most of whom were members of the eleven which held Roseburg to a 7-7 deadlock here last fall, and who have already won two early-season games, defeating Shuswap, 12 to 6, and Springfield, 7 to 6.

Tough Test Ahead.
The coaching staff believes that the Reedspoint game will be a tough test for this year's varsity, which has been built around five returning lettersmen—Wayne Albertson and Don Perry, tackles; Bert Shomaker, center; and Virgil Sanders and Eddie Nordyke, halfbacks. However, a large number of good reserves, some of whom saw considerable action last year, have developed to the point that Watts believes they will be able to fill the breaches left by graduation.

Foremost of these are Larry Anderson, 200-pound guard; Reynold, 194-pound guard; Ray Puckett, Bob Davis and Merrill Bart, ends; Hershel Byrd and "Red" Carson, fullbacks; Ted Thompson, Paul Cacy and Elwood McLaughlin, halfbacks; Cox, 219 pounds, Garhart, and S. McLaughlin, tackles; Barker, guard, and several others.

Physically, the squad is in fairly good condition. Sanders, 146-pound triple-threat, is nursing a bad ankle and a cleaved hand and three or four others are limping around from the effects of bruised muscles, strained ankles and knees. None of these injuries will have any serious effect on the strength of the team. Reserve strength this season appears to be well above the average.

ANTELOPE SEASON IN OREGON OPENS

PORTLAND, Oct. 6.—(AP)—The swift, bounding antelope of southern Oregon's sagebrush country began its season of hunting for the brief season opening today.

The number of licenses for the three-day shooting period was limited to 150 for Malheur and Harney counties and 300 for Lake county. The game commission office here announced the supply of permits had not been exhausted.

A state game department check revealed today hunters killed 4775 deer in the Mendenhall creek section of Grant county. The total included 1622 bucks, 2975 does shot under special permit and 278 fawns.

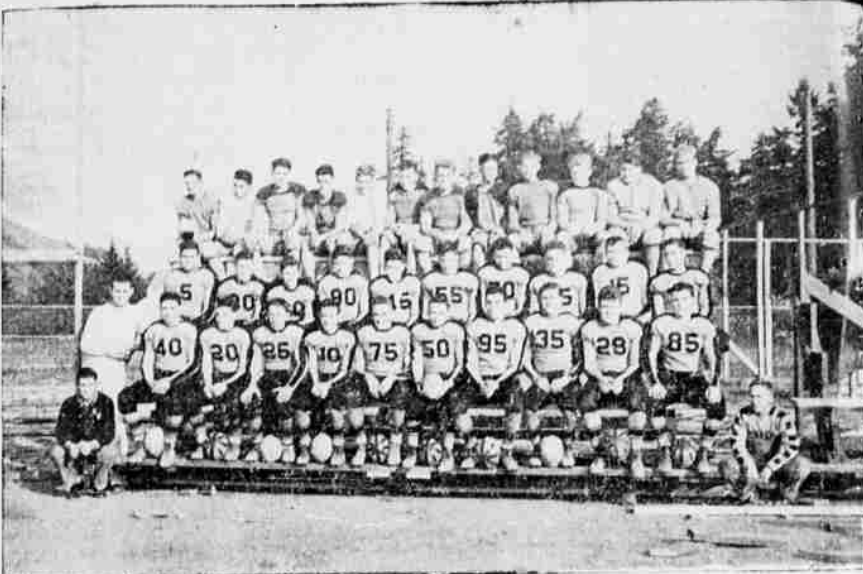
LADIES AID HAS MEETING WEDNESDAY

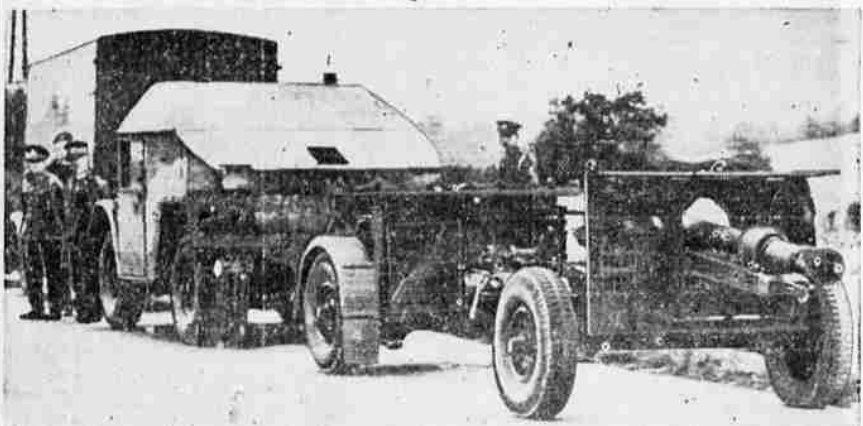

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CINCINNATI REDS NOT DISHEARTENED

**"We'll Be Back," Defiant
Cry to Yankees on Eve
of Third Battle.**

NEW YORK, Oct. 6.—(AP)—The Cincinnati Reds are a brave lot of boys. When they left here last night, bound for home and a resumption of the world series against the Yankees tomorrow, they were yelling belligerently: "We'll be back."

A full appreciation of this stout-hearted, devil-may-care attitude on the part of the National league champions can be had only by the 118,000 who sat in Yankee stadium for the past two afternoons and watched the lads from the west absorb two of the cruelest beatings ever doled out by the Yankees or any other club.

Beaten by Red Ruffing, 2 to 1, in the opener, and shut out by Monte Pearson's marvelous two-hit pitching yesterday, 4 to 0, the Reds might have been forgiven had they refused to continue their classic unless they were given a head-start of, say, three runs per game. But in their dressing room and on the cars last night they were insisting: "We'll be back!"—and Manager Bill McKechnie was railing: "Nobody can tell me we are a poor ball club as we've looked the last two days. Tell 'em we're coming home with our heads up."

At that, the Reds cannot be quite that bad, even granting that they were up against almost phenomenal pitching. Few clubs, in any kind of series, ever were mowed down so mercilessly as they have been for two days.

Ineffective at Bat.

In two games they have made just six hits, all singles. Only one Redleg, Ival Gooden, has reached second base and he scored their lone run in the first game after drawing a walk. Of the three who saw first after sampling Pearson's deservingly fast ball yesterday, two on clean hits and another on a pass, none went any farther.

When Ernie Lombardi plunked his single to center in the eighth yesterday he broke a string of 12 consecutive innings in which the Reds had failed to scratch any sort of a hit and had been retired in order by Ruffing and Pearson.

The crowded stadium was pulled for Pearson to get his no-hitter when Lombardi caught an outside curve squarely on the nose and shot it over second base. After the spell had been broken, it didn't matter so much that Bill Werber unchained another hit after two were out in the ninth. Pearson, the 30-year-old veteran from Oakland, Calif., had pitched one of the classic games of world series history, Dahlgren Top Hitter.

It is just like the Yankees that the weakest hitting regular on their side, Babe Dahlgren, should have been the batting hero of the first two games. In six official times up he has blasted a home run and two doubles, a record that even Lou Gehrig, the man he succeeded at first base, might not have bettered. He drove across the Yankees' tying run in the opening game, scored their first run yesterday after doubling to open the third frame and then hit his four-bagger in the fourth.

Both teams were scheduled to work out today at Crosley field in Cincinnati, site of the next three games. McKechnie is sticking with his original choice of Junior Thompson, rookie right-hander, to try to stop the Yankees tomorrow. Joe McCarthy will put off the announcement of his choice, which was believed to lie between Oral Hilde-
