U. S. NATIONAL BANK DEPOSITS INCREASE

In a statement of condition of the United States National bank, according to the comptroller's call as of October 2nd, deposits are shown at \$139,533,445.71. This indicates an increase in deposits of almost five million dollars since June 30, and a gain of more than 14 1/2 million dollars since the corresponding call September 25, 1938. In the same period, resources increased to \$141,838,810.81, a gain of over 15 million dollars.

According to Mr. E. S. McClain, manager of the local branch, this growth is proportionately reflected in the gain of deposits in the local unit, as well as others throughout the state.

NOTED AUTO DRIVER VISITS ROSEBURG

Harry Hartz, noted automobile racing driver, winner of the Indianapolis Memorial day race, visited for a short time in Roseburg today. He is conducting a long distance safety and dependability run for the Chevrolet company under check by the American Automobile association. The truck being operated in the "round-the-nation" run is reported to have shown exceedingly low fuel and lubrication costs in the more than 75,000 miles already covered. Mr. Hartz met with H. T. Hansen, owner-manager of the local Chevrolet agency, and members of the sales force during his short visit here to furnish information on the test run.

cedure promotes as impartially as possible this democracy's safety and peace, and does not deny arbitrarily to anyone the opportunity of obtaining such supplies as it has hitherto been customary for belligerents to obtain from neutrals in time of war."

Stimson Backs Repeal
His announcement followed a radio speech in support of the administration bill by Henry L. Stimson, former republican secretary of state. Stimson urged repeal in order to aid Great Britain and France, lest the war "in the case they are beaten... become our own battle."

Harbour was the sixth of the 23 republican senators to advocate repeal. The others are Austin and Gibson of Vermont, Taft of Ohio, Hale of Maine, and Red of Kansas. Along with them, 51 democrats and one independent (Norris of Nebraska) are counted by the administration as "sure" for pending bill. Only 49 votes are needed for passage.

ROOSEVELT MUM ON HITLER'S BID

But sources close to him said he would refuse to give further elucidation of the speech as a preliminary to negotiations for an armistice.

Details, it was said, might be worked out later but for the present only one question is: Shall war cease or go on?

Because Hitler's offer was regarded as a broad political gesture—not as a "narrow" diplomatic document—German officialdom saw no reason why President Roosevelt or any other neutral need assure himself of acceptance of an offer of mediation before making it.

"Must Be Answers"

"It is not necessary that the next step be made in full public view," one foreign office commentator said.

"The answers can be shouted or even broadcast but they can equally well be whispered. But they must be answers, not a set of counter-questions."

The German foreign office, it was said, was in no hurry and does not expect immediate action.

It was said to recognize that the father's speech must be studied carefully abroad and to feel that only patience can find a solution.

The reaction of British Prime Minister Chamberlain was awaited. In the meantime, other unfavorable British reaction was regarded as unauthorized.

Well informed sources said Hitler looked preferably to President Roosevelt as a neutral who might start negotiations to end the European war.

In these quarters, the present situation was described as a "great opportunity" for the president, but it was appreciated that past offers of his good offices for the mediation of European quarrels had been rejected by Hitler, and that the rejections were followed by propaganda directed against the United States.

May Persuade II Duce

The history of President Roosevelt's appeals gave rise to a general belief that the best qualified neutral in sight who might be persuaded to try mediation under the conditions Hitler laid down yesterday in his reichstag speech was Premier Mussolini of Italy.

There was no positive information or substantiation in Berlin, but the expectation in informed circles was that the Italian leader would make an address in the next few days to bring Hitler's offer a step nearer to realization.

BRITAIN SUSPICIOUS OF HITLER'S PROFFERED HAND

LONDON, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Britons looked with suspicion on Adolf Hitler's "outstretched hand" today as the government analyzed the father's "last chance" proposals to end the war.

It was expected the war cabinet would complete its promised "careful examination" of Hitler's re-

star speech in time to permit Prime Minister Chamberlain to deliver his reply before the house of commons Monday.

The government was silent, meanwhile on, a news dispatch from Berlin suggesting that Hitler would agree to an armistice if it proposed by President Roosevelt or the head of any other important neutral power.

The British press displayed prominently stories reporting that Hitler's reichstag address was regarded in the United States as offering little hope for cessation of hostilities.

The same view was taken editorially by most British newspapers. Only among the minority communist and pacifist groups was there a sympathetic response to the father's proposal.

The ministry of information announced that August Zaleski, foreign minister in the Polish government set up in Paris last week, would visit London next week to confer with Foreign Secretary Lord Halifax and other members of the British war cabinet.

This was regarded in foreign circles as evidence of Britain's refusal to make peace at the price of Poland.

FRANCE IGNORES OFFER. PREPARES FOR LONG WAR

PARIS, Oct. 7.—(AP)—France settled herself today for a long war, her announced determination to "carry on to victory" apparently unshaken by Adolf Hitler's "last" offer to call off hostilities.

There were indications of a growing conviction that the war was about to enter a new phase, marked by large scale operations and the new threat of a German air offensive.

Military leaders indicated France was prepared for any surprises the nazis might spring.
