LITHUANIANS TO REGAIN CAPITAL

KATINAS, Lithuania, Oct. 10.—(AP)—Informed Lithuanians said today their country would regain her ancient capital, Wilno (Vilna), by the soviet Russian-Lithuanian mutual assistance pact which they expected to be signed tonight. They asserted that in return for concessions to Russia Lithuania would get back about half the territory she would have received under the soviet-Lithuanian treaty of 1920 if the Poles had not seized Wilno in that year. (A Copenhagen dispatch said the territory involved in the transfer had a population of 500,000 to 600,000.) All of Wilno province fell into Russian hands in the German-soviet division of Poland.

OBSCENE LETTER WRITER PENALIZED

MEDFORD, Oct. 10.—(AP)—C. C. McCorkle, 71, Josephine county miner, who entered a plea of guilty to a federal indictment of sending obscene matter through the mails, was sentenced to eighteen months in prison and then given five years' probation by Federal Judge McCulloch this morning. The probation was granted upon the recommendation of the federal probation officer. McCorkle was charged with

sending the obscene letter to a minor girl living at Wellplatt, Wash.

EXPLOSION FORCES CREW FROM SHIP

LONDON, Oct. 10.—(AP)—An explosion which caused the crew of the 8,063-ton British steamer Marwarri to abandon their ship off the coast of Wales was disclosed today. Five of the crew of 91 were injured, but none seriously. It was not disclosed immediately whether the ship sank, nor was the cause of the explosion known.
