

CIO-AFL REUNION APPEARS REMOTE

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 11.—(AP)—A guarantee of peace for America and a greater CIO were held out today as the primary objectives of the Congress of Industrial Organizations holding its annual convention here.

Consideration of a reunion with the AFL appeared to be far from the minds of the CIO leaders as they urged delegates to "organize the unorganized" and talked of enlarging the controlling international executive body.

In his opening address at the first day of the convention yesterday, John L. Lewis, CIO president, talked proudly of the 4,000,000 members of the CIO roles, predicted in five years there would be 10,000,000 and never once mentioned the AFL, whose leaders at their Cincinnati convention, suggested plans for AFL-CIO unity should be referred to the CIO.

RUSSIANS PRAISE KILLER OF PRIESTS

MOSCOW, Oct. 11.—(AP)—The Moscow newspaper Izvestia (The Godless), rogan of the antireligious movement, indicated today that a large number of Roman Catholic and Greek Orthodox priests were "liquidated" when soviet Russian troops marched into White Russia and the western Ukraine in partitioned Poland.

The newspaper asserted that many priests barricaded themselves "with capitalists and Polish officers in Catholic churches and met the Red army with machine-gun fire."

Other articles, assailing both Catholic and Orthodox priests in the region, accused them of espionage and being in the pay of the Polish government.

The paper praised a red army soldier who, it said, threw several hand grenades into a group of priests and Polish officers who refused to surrender, killing all of them.

The paper said church and monastery lands had been divided and turned over to the workers and peasants.

U. S. ARMY'S GOAL PLACED AT 600,000

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10.—(AP)—President Roosevelt hinted today that the administration's goal for army strength was about 600,000 men, including regulars, the national guard and organized reserves.

At his press conference Mr. Roosevelt was asked whether the administration's view on defense coincided with a statement contained in a recent speech of Louis Johnson, assistant secretary of war, the army should be built up to about 600,000.

The president said that was not very far off, but that, of course, the figure included the national guard and organized reserves.

He added if the present strength of all these is added together the 600,000 figure will be found to be not very far above the total.

A cargo of 1,200 tons of German-made toys arrived yesterday on a Holland-America line freighter. A ship official said the toys were shipped from the reich to The Netherlands in 20 freight cars.

SLEEPING SICKNESS AT END; BRAIN DEAD

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 10.—(AP)—Dr. H. R. Emerson, child specialist, reported today six-year-old Maxine Varrington had aroused from four years of sleeping sickness but her brain has been scarred so badly she always will be "practically dead mentally."

The girl, he said, is growing and her body is again functioning normally, but:

"The inflammation of the brain tissue through which Maxine has survived, has left her brain scarred at its base. The brain lags as if there were no brain at all. Its functions have ceased."

He explained that "brain tissue, once injured or scarred never recovers."

"Sometimes victims of encephalitis lethargica recover completely, or die," he added. "Instead of dying, Maxine has been left without mentality."

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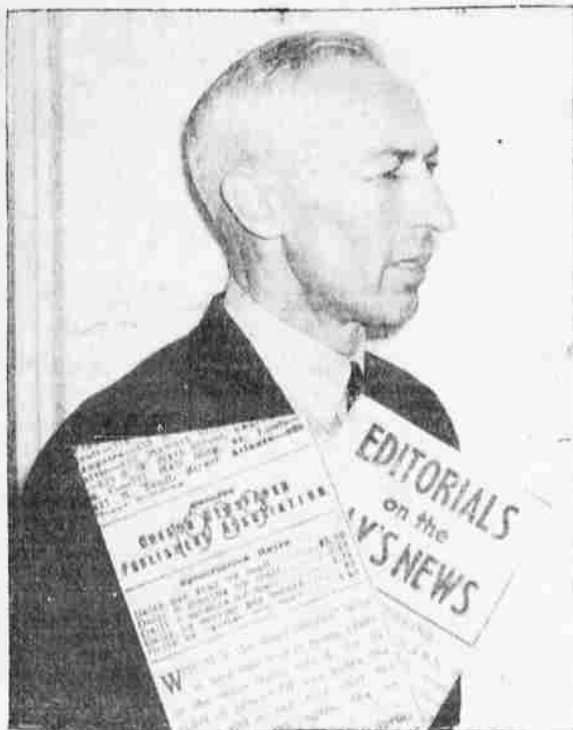
