BRITAIN DENIES GAS FURNISHED POLAND

LONDON, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Britain today denied a German report who had supplied gas to Poland for use against German soldiers.

(In Berlin last night DND, German official news agency, issued a 2,000 word statement charging Britain had delivered mustard gas to Poland.)

An authoritative British statement contradicted that it called "a report circulated from Berlin" that Polish troops used British gas in an explosion that killed four soldiers at Jazlo.

PEP RALLY OPENS GRID SEASON HERE

R.H.S. Indians Ready for First Home Game, With Coquille as Foe.

One of the greatest crowds of students and townspeople in years turned out last night at Finlay field for the annual bonfire and pep rally which officially opened the local grid season. Under the enthusiastic leadership of the yell leaders and girls' rally committee, the students serenaded, sang songs, yelled and chanted war cries, exhorting the Indian grid team to knock over the invading foe from Coquille High school in the opening game Friday night.

Completely unperturbed by the noisy gathering, the flames of the bonfire, Coach Jim Watts ran his Indian eleven through a spirited signal drill and scrimmage for more than an hour under the big lights of the field in the final tilt without before the tough game with the East Devils. The entire squad, with the exception of 13-wood McLoughlin, portended left halfback, who was injured a week ago, was in suit. Several players are not in the best of shape, but all have vowed to be ready for the Coquille tilt.

The Indians have a tough nut to crack in the Coquille aggregation which last week pulverized a poorly-rated Marshfield eleven, 28 to 0. Coach "Spike" Leslie has one of the finest teams in the history of the school, according to reports of several who witnessed the Pirate-Red Devil encounter. With 12 lettermen back, Coach Leslie's squad is starting the season where they left off at the close of the 1938 season and are considered by many observers to be the strongest team in southwestern Oregon.

Coach Watts believes that the experience gained in the Reedsport contest has materially aided the new men, some of whom played their first game of football, and that his charges will undoubtedly show 100 per cent improvement against a far tougher team tomorrow night. The Indian players themselves are determined to give a good account in their first home appearance.
