CONFERENCE LISTS SATURDAY GAMES

Oregon Favored to Defeat California; U. C. L. A. Takes on Stanford.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 12.—(A)—The far western football spotlight swings to this section tomorrow as two strong contenders for the Pacific Coast conference title risk their undefeated records against a couple of teams which haven't started clicking yet.

At Berkeley, Oregon, which tied Southern California and beat Stanford, furnishes the first conference competition for University of California's Bears, trimmed by Little College of the Pacific and St. Mary's.

Both U. C. L. A. and Oregon will take the field as favorites, over teams which normally would be on the heavy end of the odds.

Another conference game will send Washington against Washington State college in a traditional affair at Pullman. The game was considered a toss-up.

Illinois Regarded Loser U. S. C. will hook up with Illinois in an inter-sectional battle at Los Angeles. The Big Ten representative was held to a scoreless tie by Little Bradley Tech two weeks ago, and was expected to be easy prey for the "powerhouse" of the coast conference.

Oregon State, undefeated in two starts, expects to take things easy and give the reserves some exercise Saturday in a non-conference game with University of Portland at the latter's field.

Gonzaga, victor over Texas Tech last week after dropping its first two encounters, takes on Idaho at Spokane tonight.

Sunday games will put St. Mary's against Loyola at Los Angeles and Santa Clara against University of San Francisco here.

WEEK'S SAVINGS ON FOOD PRICES SLIM

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.—(AP)—The American housewife saved three-quarters of one per cent on her grocery budget last week as food prices continued to react from the sudden rise at the start of the war.

Secretary Perkins reported the average retail decline today as shown by the bureau of labor statistics survey for the week ending Oct. 10.

"Prices of most of the 15 staple foods were either unchanged or lower," she said. "Some decreased by as much as 11 per cent."

Lard prices declined sharply. Miss Perkins said, averaging four or five per cent less than the previous week, but they were still between 15 and 20 per cent above August figures in most cities.

Miss Perkins reported prices of pork chops, bacon, navy beans, and sugar moved downward fairly consistently, decreasing generally by from two to five per cent. Navy beans, however, were still 15 to 40 per cent above the August 15 prices. Pork chops were at or below the August level in nine of 12 principal cities.

PRISON WHIPPING STIRS GOV. OLSON

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Governor Gilbert L. Olson, commenting on a report that four San Quentin prison guards had whipped 41 young prisoners, declared today he would retire prison board members from office if he found the charges were true.

A report of the alleged whipping, published in a copyright story by the San Francisco Chronicle, said the prisoners were whipped with lead-tipped leather straps because they had refused to take "torture" punishment after participating in a hunger strike last February and March.
