OCTOBER NOVELS AT ROSEBURG CITY LIBRARY

"The Priory" by Dorothy Whipple. An entertaining and well-characterized story of the people who live at Saunby Priory, an old English estate. Major Marwood, who is dissatisfied with the way his house is run, marries the awkward and foolish Anthea Sumpton—but Anthea turns out not to be so docile after all—and changes things at the Priory for the major, his peculiar sister, Victor, his two daughters, and the servants as well. "Children of God" by Vardis Fisher. The Harper prize novel of 1939 is built on an epic scale. It has two central figures, the prophet, Joseph Smith, and the man of action, Brigham Young, and the story has as its background the whole history of the Mormon church.

"Magna by Zora Gale—A dramatic novel of middlewestern small town life and a girl who must choose between two loves, by a notable writer and playwright. "Arizona" by Clarence Buding Kelland. The story of a girl who made pies, money and American history. Phoebe Tittus, finding herself broke in Arizona, in the mid-nineteenth century, starts to bake pies and sell them at a dollar apiece.

"Jack Roads" by Katherine Haviland-Taylor. The sympathetic tale of a country doctor, a man of genuine nobility and gallantry.

"Breakneck Brook" by Margaret Flint. The hills of Maine form the background for this story of Thurloes, who, in spite of her pretty face, liked a rocky brook for company and a farm kitchen for occupation.

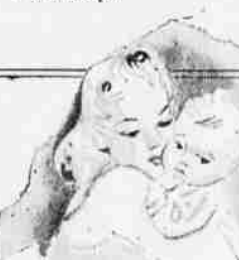
