KLANSMAN FAILS TO GAIN HIS LIBERTY

NOBLESVILLE, Ind., Oct. 17.—(AP)—Circuit Judge Cassius M. Gentry today denied the plea of D. C. Stephenson, Indiana political power in the heyday of the Ku Klux Klan, for a new trial in the death of Madge Oberholzer in 1925.

Stephenson, convicted here fourteen years ago of second degree murder and sentenced to life imprisonment in connection with the death of Miss Oberholzer, a state-house stenographer, contended in a hearing this month that the jury's verdict was "void" because the indictment against him charged first degree murder.

Judge Gentry accepted the state view that the legal points raised by Stephenson already had been disposed of in the state supreme court and were not subject to review here.
