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ORDINARILY the food shopping for the editor's household is done by the lady of the house. But this morning we took a look around—shopping, as the ladies say—in several food stores in this city. Herring a pound of grapes for mashing purposes, and grapes are so tempting this time of year, no purchases were made. The object of the visitations was to see what kind of canned meat is being gotten off to and consumed by the public.

Let it be said at the outset that our comments here are not intended as criticism of the local merchants. They must buy what is most available at the lowest price. The market at prices they know people are willing to pay and at prices that will meet competition. No grocer could stay long in business who ignored those principles of merchandising.

Now regarding the canned meats. Much of the canned meat, beef, or the whole comes from Uruguay. It is as labeled—you can see it for yourself. Most of the canned corned beef comes either from Argentina or from Paraguay. The Paraguay variety is canned in London. Everyone knows that the best cattle industry is a large one in the United States and that there has been no reported shortage of beef.

But we have reciprocal trade agreements with foreign countries which are favorable to their selling beef to us. Thus the beef cattle industry is seriously damaged because the foreign article can under sell the product of our own ranches. Likewise an agreement was made with Canada which seriously damages our northwest lumber industry.

Now in fact this very day, headlines are going on in Washington, D. C. with a view to making a reciprocal trade agreement with some South American countries on turkeys. Putting it bluntly we are about to see the present tariff protection taken off the imports of turkeys and the turkey industry of the northwest states pretty well wrecked.

Why the administrative marks certain farming areas of the nation for reduction is not understood able—but it is being done. Then dozens of millions of dollars have been spent, and more millions are being spent, to aid the farmers of the United States and yet at the same time government that spends to aid farmers making direct and energetic efforts to run away from us, thus creating the worst for many farmers.

But the turkey's attention has not yet been made. The current hearings are for the purpose of gathering facts. No one expects the hearing to put a matter at issue, but we might be able to make enough of a protest to move off the fatal action.

FROM San Quentin come disturbing rumors of whipping of prisoners with a rubber hose. They are disturbing for this reason: If, after all these years of progress, we can think of nothing better to do with rebellious inmates of penitentiaries than to WHIP THEM, we aren't progressing as fast as we ought to be.

INTEREST (momentarily at least) shifts back to Turkey, whose foreign minister is said to have refused these Russian demands:

1. Recognition of the partition of Poland.
2. Formation of a neutral Balkan bloc under Russian domination.
3. Expansion of Bulgaria and Russia at Romania's expense.

It sounds just a little as if British diplomats at Istanbul have been getting in some good lies.

THE Turkish fleet anchors in the Dardanelles, and Turkish military preparations are stepped up on hearing of concentrations of Russian troops in the Caucasus, facing Turkey. Moscow denies that Russian troops are in the Caucasus in unusual numbers.

TOKYO. Hitting a floating German mine off Kure, Japan, the Japanese light cruiser Takachio was sent to the bottom with a loss of 314 men of a crew of 357 men. It is announced.

VIENNA. The Russians have already lost 40,000 men in unsuccessful attempts to storm Przemyśl. It was officially announced.

BERLIN. With the sinking by four German destroyers last week, 193 men, including practically all of the officers, were lost. It was officially admitted.

LONDON. Success by the allies in a series of desperate fights for the possession of Dunkirk is claimed by the northwest by General Von Boehm. This attempt was repulsed. Reinforced, the Germans started for the coast a second time, moving northwest from Lille by way of St. Omer.
