

FARMERS TO NAME AAA COMMITTEES

Election of Oregon farmers who will serve on county and community committees in administering the 1940 AAA program will be held soon, according to announcement by N. C. Donaldson, of Corvallis, state administrator.

Community elections, at which 568 community committees and alternates will be selected, will be held throughout the state on October 27. County conventions, attended by one delegate from each community, will be held shortly thereafter. These county committees and one alternate will be elected at each county convention.

A total of 1005 Oregon farmers serve on community and county committees, taking part in administering the federal government's agricultural conservation program, Donaldson said. They represent approximately 42,000 Oregon farmers participating in the conservation program.

By balloting in community halls, courthouses, schoolhouses and other community meeting places, farmers have a direct voice in selecting the men who will be in charge of the AAA program in their county, Donaldson pointed out.

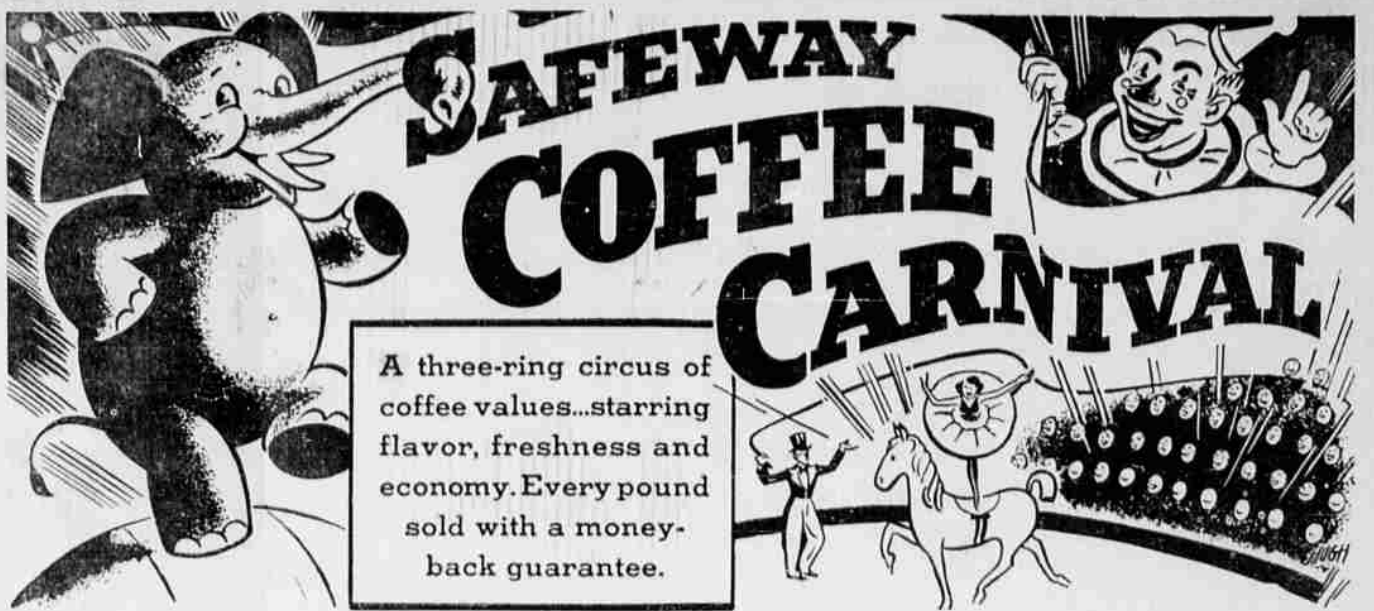

COFFEEPOTS: Bring coffee and water to boiling. Stir well. Add small amount of cold water and let stand 5 minutes to settle grounds.
