One of the largest golden wedding celebrations ever to be held in this city, occurred Sunday, October 15th, when Mr. and Mrs. J. E. McClintock, received relatives and friends at an afternoon and evening reception at their attractive home on East Cass street. About four hundred called during the day to honor the McClintocks.

Mr. and Mrs. J. E. McClintock, prominent Roseburg residents since January, 1912, celebrated their golden wedding anniversary Sunday, October 15, at a charming afternoon and evening reception at their lovely home on East Cass street. About four hundred friends and relatives called during the day to congratulate the McClintocks upon the happy occasion. The day also marked the seventieth birthday anniversary of Mr. McClintock.

Mr. McClintock, now Lulu Woodhouse, was born December 19, 1868, at Wilton, Iowa, to John L. and Lydia Woodhouse. Mr. McClintock, born October 15, 1869, was a son of Rev. A. and Nancy Jane McClintock, of Mount Vernon, Mo.

Mr. and Mrs. McClintock were married October 15, 1889, at Wilton, Muscatine county, Iowa. Their first son at the wedding, Guy E. Woodhouse, of Los Angeles, a brother of Mrs. McClintock, arrived here Sunday for the golden wedding celebration. The maid of honor, Mrs. Ida Davis Moore, of Ames, Iowa, sent a telegram to the McClintocks in honor of the occasion. Mr. Woodhouse had not seen his sister for thirty-two years, until coming to Roseburg Sunday.

Other relatives of Mrs. McClintock's coming to Roseburg for the affair included: Her brother, Rush L. Woodhouse and Mrs. Woodhouse, of Redlands, Calif.; and Vera Gabriel Abbott, of Banning, Calif., a niece. The latter, formerly a prominent vocal soloist in Chicago, is the daughter of the late Charles H. Gabriel, famous composer.

Mr. McClintock's brother and two sisters were present for the affair and included: A. K. McClintock, of Salem; Mrs. Lester Heywood, society editor of the Chico, Calif., paper; and Mrs. O. M. Nicholas, formerly of this city and now of Los Angeles, Calif.

Mr. and Mrs. McClintock moved from Iowa, where the former was engaged in railroad service in Spokane, Wash., where he was an orchardist, later moving to Roseburg in 1912. In 1913 Mr. McClintock and A. J. Geddes purchased the Commercial Abstract company. As for the world war, Leon E. McClintock went into business with his father, acquiring the interest of Mr. Geddes.

Mr. McClintock has been active in civic affairs since his residence here, having served twice as president of the chamber of commerce; seven years as city councilman; was mayor of Roseburg for four years and is a past president of the Pottery club. Both Mr. and Mrs. McClintock are active in the Methodist church of this city.

The McClintocks are the parents of three sons and a daughter: Leon E. McClintock, of Roseburg; John L. McClintock, who is employed by the Standard Oil company in Portland; Dr. James A. McClintock, professor of psychology and religious philosophy at Brother college in Madison, New Jersey; and Mrs. Vera McClintock Jones, of Roseburg.

The grandchildren include: Richard Patricia and Nancy, children of the Leon McClintock; Terry, son of Mrs. Jones; Delight and Tommy, sons of the John McClintock; and Charles, Joan and Joan, children of the Dr. James McClintock.
