SAM GORDON, THE KIBITZER, TALKS BRIDGE LECTURES HERE ON NOV. 23-4

Sam Gordon, The Kibitzer, will be in Roseburg to deliver a three-day contract bridge lecture lesson series on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, November 2nd, 3rd and 4th, at St. George's Episcopal parish hall at two o'clock afternoon and eight o'clock evenings. Mr. Gordon is being brought to Roseburg under the auspices of the chapter of the P.E.O. Sisterhood and the proceeds of the three-day series will go to the P.E.O. educational fund.

Members of the chapter of the P.E.O. Sisterhood are conducting an advance ticket sale and anyone desiring to purchase tickets may telephone 323-1; 323-3 or 754-3.

The subjects to be covered each afternoon and night of the same day will be the same. In this manner, the holder of a series ticket receives complete course by attending either the night or the afternoon sessions, with privilege of review by attending both.

Mr. Gordon is the contract bridge pioneer of the northwest as lecturer, newspaper columnist, radio and class teacher. He is author of the House Sense method, a simplified and easy-to-learn treatment of the game.
