CONTRACT BRIDGE LECTURES TO BE GIVEN HERE NOV. 23-4

Contract bridge is a cinch, according to Sam Gordon, The Klubber, who will be here for a series of contract bridge lessons-lectures November 23-4 to be presented at two o'clock afternoons and eight o'clock evenings at St. George's Episcopal parish hall on East Cass street, under the auspices of the chapter of the P. E. O. Sisterhood.

He says the only aim of two partners in a bridge game is to tell each other how many tricks they expect to take; and what is their best trump suit. If any, and that's all. And to give that information, a player need not be a civil engineer, a statistician and a clairvoyant.

All he needs is to learn the few basic rules and signals used by experts and other practical players, which is the horse sense method, the only requirements to play on acceptable bridge game. His method of counting tricks is the natural way any player would use if he were not confused by too many suggestions. You merely total up your aces, kings, queens and the tricks you expect to trump. All other departments of the game are treated in the same vein of simplicity.

Noted Theologian To Be Back on Air

The Lutheran hour, featuring the sermons of this noted theologian, Dr. Walter A. Maier of Concordia seminary, will be resumed Sunday, October 29, over a coast-to-coast network of 81 stations, including KRRR, Roseburg.

An advocate of Christian life founded on the Scriptures, Dr. Maier has gained wide recognition for his implacable opposition to atheism, communism and other anti-religious doctrines. The Lutheran hour, which declared purpose is to "bring Christ to the Nation," is credited with the widest distribution of the cross in the history of religious evangelism, half a million miniature gold crosses having been mailed to listeners.

LARGER FARM CASH INCOME FORESEEN

CORVALLIS, Oct. 24.—(AP)—L. R. Drethaupt, Oregon State college extension agricultural economist, predicts Oregon farmers would receive a larger cash income this year compared with 1938 but the total would not be as great as in 1937.

An increase in the general price level and more extensive production were responsible for the trend. The Oregon farm price index gained nine points from mid-August to mid-September, although it receded in recent weeks.

Brethaupt reported advancing farm costs had not kept pace with the price rise for farm products. More favorable prices were attributed somewhat to war speculation. Moderate gains in industrial activity were expected to sustain farm increases.
