The trouble with most players, Mr. Gordon says, is that they try to learn and play the game the hard way. They end by knowing too many things that are not so. All they are expected to do is to tell each other what their hands contain in the simplest possible manner.

As an advocate of extreme simplicity, he shows players how to play the game understandingly with a minimum of effort in the natural manner which experts employ in a game which is not the way they describe it in books.

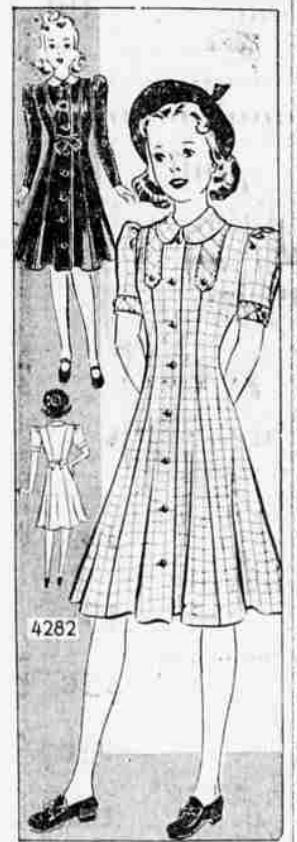
