Angelus Hour to Ring Up Its Third Anniversary on KRNR Program



Next Sunday afternoon at 1:30 to 5 o'clock over KRNR, Dr. Charles A. Edwards will complete three full years of the Angelus hour. During that time every hour has been filled. This is the oldest continuous religious service over the air since KRNR was established. The title, "Angelus Hour," is the only one in the United States. It is taken by Mr. Edwards from the famous painting, shown above, known as "The Angelus," by John Millet. It is a picture of a sunset scene. A man and a woman are in the field, picking potatoes, and as the sun sinks in the west the church bell rings, calling the people to prayer. This peasant man and woman stop their work and bow their heads in prayer. It is a custom in France to this day. Mr. Edwards selected this name in preference to vesper hour. He gratefully acknowledges the generous support and the many kind expressions received by mail, and also by personal word.

MONDAY EVENING PSYCHOLOGY AND SPEECH CLASS MEETS

In spite of the inclement weather, a well-attended class turned out for the regular Monday evening classes in psychology and speech being conducted by Dr. Leland G. Leavitt. The class completed a study of the technique of making statements effectively. SCHOOL COURSES HELD INADEQUATE

SALEM, Oct. 27.—(AP)—More than 200 Oregon high school principals attending a convention here today agreed that high school courses in mathematics and health are inadequate.

A committee recommended that general mathematics be required of all sophomores, and that geometry and algebra, if taken, be studied as near as possible to the time of college entrance. It said solid geometry and trigonometry should not be taught in high schools, and that more emphasis should be placed on business arithmetic.

Since only 20 per cent of high school students enter college, the committee recommended that college preparation be recognized as the secondary aim of the high school, not the primary aim.

Questionnaires answered by 113 principals showed that 70 believe students do poorly in college entrance mathematics examinations because they do not use algebra and geometry enough to remember what they learned in high school, while 25 said the cause was poor high school instruction.

The principals approved a committee report that the common practice of teaching health only one day a week was unsatisfactory and that there is unnecessary duplication in health courses.
