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THE work of a football team is usually measured by the fans only by the results chalked up in the win and loss column. The disastrous season experienced thus far by the R. H. S. Indians has produced many long and loud wails by some local sports enthusiasts and, as could be expected, much criticism has been directed against the coaching staff. It only is natural that the coach be held responsible by fans for the success or failure of his team. But there are many factors which Roseburg fans should take into consideration before criticizing the coaches too severely.

Under present conditions in Roseburg high school it would require a miracle man to produce a football team capable of meeting the type of opposition the Indians have faced this season.

The first factor to be considered in building a football team is the material available. Without criticizing the present school system, the trend of the past few years has been to advance boys and girls as rapidly as possible through the various departments. Older fans will remember that in their high school days they and their opponents had whippers. Various high schools have solved the problem of the young talent by securing the adjoining communities for husky lads, who, lacking the advantages of city education, are older and more mature, and not so far advanced in school activities. Through cooperation of fans these lads are given jobs or financial help which enables them to remain in town to attend high school and play on the team. Such a practice, if advisable, needs financial cooperation which Roseburg fans so far have not offered.

Another factor to be considered is the matter of experience. A coach can hardly be expected to take a group of boys, most of whom are totally ignorant of the finer points of the game, and develop a successful team in three short weeks.

This leads to a suggestion it seems could be put into operation in Roseburg without much expense, and which should stimulate interest in football and at the same time increase available high school material.

Sufficient coaching staff could be provided to supervise lunch football in the grade schools. Touch football is a game which can be played with a minimum of equipment and with little physical danger to participants. Yet, the youngsters could be taught the fundamentals of play, strategy, formations, etc., which are essential in later stages of the game.

The junior high school system offers an opportunity also for six-man football—a game rapidly growing in popularity—where tackling, blocking, punning and other fundamentals could be taught by a capable coach. In the junior high school there would be material for a number of six-man teams, which could engage in home tournaments and perhaps meet other six-man teams of the county.

As a reward for capable performance players should be taken on every possible occasion to Eugene, Corvallis, Ashland, Monmouth, Salem and other cities to see college teams in action. There, by example, the boys would learn more football than they could be taught in many moons by a coach. Thus there would come into high school a number of boys with sufficient experience and incentive to form the nucleus of a good high school team.

WAR 25 Years Ago Today

October 31, 1914.

PARIS.—Unless the allies meet an unexpected reverse, the seat of the French government will be re-transferred from Bordeaux to Paris on November 20, it was stated on an official but reliable authority. By then, it is predicted by general Gallien's aides, the Germans would have been compelled to entirely evacuate French territory.

TOKIO.—The Japanese, English and Indian troops are reported to have taken another of the German's outlying Kiao Chan forts and to be assaulting the entire Teutonic position with great violence.

PORTLAND.—Additional European bidding caused a further rise in wheat. Club wheat advanced a cent, and is selling at \$1.10. Bluestem wheat rose a cent and a half, and is selling at \$1.12. At the rate wheat is being bought, exporters believe the entire Northwest crop will be cleaned up soon.

LONDON.—Attacking the Turkish naval squadron in the Black sea, Russian warships sunk a mine layer and destroyer, and captured a collier, according to a home dispatch to the Star. The message said the Turks were bombarding Sevastopol.
